Maritime Job Printing Plant Moving Into Box Production

HALIFAX (CP)—Rolph-Clark-Stone Eastern Ltd., one of the largest job printing firms in the Atlantic provinces, is moving into production of containers for the food and clothing industries.

The printing firm announced it has purchase control of Eastern Paper Box Manufacturing Ltd., which opened a factory here in 1962 with the aid of the provincial development agency, Industrial Estates Ltd.

M. Earl Whynot, general manager of Rolph-Clark-Stone's eastern division, said the company would expand the box manufacturing plant and one of the first moves would be installation of a \$50,000 German-made machine for producing deluxe chocolate boxes.

Liquor Revenue Figures Given

OTTAWA (CP)—Domestic beer, liquor and wine sales brought the government \$355,867,933 in excise tax revenue in 1965 and an undetermined amount on top of that through the federal sales tax, the Commons was told.

State Secretary Judy LaMarsh gave the information in a written return for Barry Mather (NDP—New Westminster). The return said the figures did not include revenue raised through the 11-per-cent federal sales tax which is "not identifiable with specific commodities."

Mr. Mather also asked how much money the government spent on promoting temperance and supporting anti-alcoholic programs. The reply said none.
