Italy Wants Compensation. WASHINGTON, April 3. Italy is pressing the United States government for prompt legal proceedings against the New Orleans mob who lynched several Italian citizens recently, and for compensation to the families of the victims. The Marquis De Rudine, the Italian premier, sent a sharp note to Blaine yesterday on these lines.

Prominent Mason Dead.

WASHINGTON, April 3. Geo. Albert Pike, Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite of Masonry, and Chief of the Royal Order of Scotland, died at Washington yesterday. Paralysis of the organs of the throat prevented his taking food since March 21st. Mr. Pike was born in Boston eighty-two years ago.

Trying to Make Peace.

OTTAWA, April 3. General Herbert will leave Ottawa in a day or two for Halifax to straighten out the petty wrangling among the military officers there.

The Manitoba Schools Matter.

OTTAWA, April 3. The Government has not yet taken any action on the Manitoba Schools matter, which is being considered by the Minister of Justice in its legal bearing.

Montreal's Population.

MONTREAL, April 3. A private census of Montreal gives the city 211,302 of a population, occupying 34,447 houses. The Catholics outnumber the Protestants three to one.

Another Railway Deal.

MONTREAL, April 3. It is alleged that the C. P. R. are trying to get hold of the South Eastern Railway from St. Lambert to Sorel, and that they will extend their line to Point Levis. This means another bridge at Montreal East.
