# Howard's Cove Fishing Harbor Project Details

OTTAWA, (Special)—Details of the proposed fishing harbor at Howard's Cove, Prince County, whose construction was authorized by the Minister of Public Works at the initiative of J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal M.P. for Prince were made public here late Friday.

Two breakwaters of stone rip-rap will be built out from the shore to enclose the new harbor. The north wall will be 650 feet in length and the west wall 300 feet. Top surface of the breakwaters will be 10 feet wide for the entire length. Their sides will have a one foot in one slope except on the seaward side when the slope will be one in three. Sides of the breakwaters will be faced with wet stone from low water spring tide to the top of the work.

Preference for jobs at Howard's Cove will be given to competent and available ex-serve-men.

It is noted in the specifications that Prince Edward Island sandstone is not deemed sufficiently durable for the stonework on the breakwaters. Stone must be solid
