Founded. NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 7. The United States steamer which left this port for New York this morning, is reported to have foundered about half a mile off the south of this harbor, and all hands are supposed to have been lost. There is no way of positively confirming the report, as no tug in the harbor could live through the search outside. Brantford, eight miles to the eastward, reports that a large quantity of wreckage is coming ashore and strewn along the beach for miles. A Big Jump. NIAGARA FALLS, Nov. 7. Lawrence Donovan, of New York, jumped from the new Suspension Bridge this morning. He made the jump successfully at a distance of 190 feet. He said before he got out of the water that he would not jump again for a million dollars. Afterwards he said he would jump next summer for \$1,000. Revolt Quelled. SOFIA, Nov. 7. A Bourgas revolt has been quelled. The revolted fled on the approach of the loyal troops. The government authority has been restored in the town. Shot in a Quarrel. SAN JOSE, Cal., Nov. 7. Owen Olemaette, an artist, son of wealthy parents residing in England, was shot and instantly killed last night in a quarrel. Sudden Death. LONDON, Nov. 7. Viscount Barrington died suddenly on Saturday, at the residence of Lady Wiltoughly, Deeresby, Gainsborough, Lincolnshire. Perished in the Flames. QUIN, Ont., Nov. 7. Mrs. Davis, aged 70, who had entered John Davis burning building to save valuables, perished in the flames. First Snow. WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 7. The first snow of the season began falling here at noon to-day. The storm was severe and lasted three hours. Militia Promotion. OTTAWA, Nov. 6. Major J. H. Macpherson has taken formal command of the Governor General's Foot Guards. Weather Bulletin. TORONTO, November 8—10 a.m. Moderate to fresh west and southwest winds, fair, cooler weather. Supreme Court. MONDAY, NOV. 8. The Supreme Court opened this morning at eleven o'clock, the three Judges being present. The hearing of an application for a writ of certiorari to remove a conviction made by the Stipendiary Magistrate of Charlottetown against John Joy for a breach of the Scott Act, was the first case called on. There are several grounds for the writ, the principal being that the Magistrate directed the City Marshal to bring the prosecution, and that on that ground, as well as because the fines are paid into the city funds, out of which the Stipendiary receives his salary, he is disqualified by reason of interest from trying the case. There are seven similar applications by different defendants. Mr. Arthur Peters appeared for the applicants, and Mr. Davies, Q. C., for the city. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. Carrying it Too Far. SIR,—There can be but one feeling amongst all discreet and sober-minded persons in the community as to some of the remarks in the editorial of the last Protestant Union, respecting our worthy Stipendiary Magistrate. The press has, doubtless, a right to insist upon public officers performing their duty; but in the exercise of that right the public have also a right to expect that the amenities of social life shall be sacredly observed, especially when the writer is under the protection of the holy office. It was expected that when the Protestant Union passed under the management of its present editor the standard of taste and propriety would be elevated—and so it has been in a very appreciable proportion—but this almost weekly dogging of Mr. Fitzgerald is beyond justification. The rev. editor must not imagine that the fact of his being "senior" and more "travelled" than his neighbor can shelter him de lege talionis, when the man whom he has attacked speaks words in self-defence. Mr. Frame seems determined to exterminate Mr. Fitzgerald—not merely to have him thrust out of office, but out of the legal profession as well. But I am mistaken if the intelligent and loyal temperance men of Charlottetown will accept his decision as to the former—and in the latter, notwithstanding the unchristian spirit that would throw him as a pauper upon the world—the "Senior" might find material for comprehensive and profitable meditation. Seeking for the Rev. Editor's motives for this unceasing persecution, I find that the Protestant Union has of late been complaining that Presbyterians have not their due influence in the affairs of the state—and the editor has actually offered to nominate two men of his own persuasion for the approaching Dominion election—and, according to the eternal fitness of things, he probably has a good son of the Kirk in view, to sit in the seat of the present Stipendiary Magistrate when he shall have hounded him from office.
