Tid Bits From Here And There

Sandy Koufax, the pitching wonder of the Los Angeles Dodgers did what every pitcher that ever stepped on a mound dreams about when he fired a 'perfect game' at the Chicago Cubs Thursday night.

This was the fourth no-hit game for Koufax and this puts the hurling ace in the record books as the first man to pitch four no-hitters in major league competition.

Koufax fired his first no-hit contest against the New York Mets in 1962, blanked the Giants in 1963 and recorded his third no-hitter against the Phillies last year.

Only two other pitchers since the turn of the century have hurled as many as three no hitters: Denton Cy Young and Bob Feller.

This was the sixth perfect game in the history of National League history. Baseball's last perfect game was pitched by Jim Bunning of Philadelphia Phillies June 21, 1964 against New York Mets.

Jack Nicklaus Scoffs At Role

By JOE MOOSHIL AKRON, Ohio (AP)—Masters champion Jack Nicklaus, who in the past has made the world series of golf his own private party, pooch-pooched the tag of overwhelming favorite placed on him in the \$77,500 36-hole extravaganza which begins today.

"I don't know how anyone can call me the favorite in anything the way I've been playing golf," said Nicklaus, who won the first two world series, but didn't qualify last year, because he failed to win a major championship.

"This is anyone's show," he said. "It's only 36 holes and one hot hand can pick up all the chips."

Nicklaus will be matched against U.S. Open champion Gary Player, Professional Golfer's Association titlist Dave Marr and British Open winner Peter Thomson.

Nicklaus wasn't kidding about the poor golf he has been playing. Since finishing a second-place tie for the PGA, he has been 38th in the Carling world open and 53rd in the American golf classic last month.

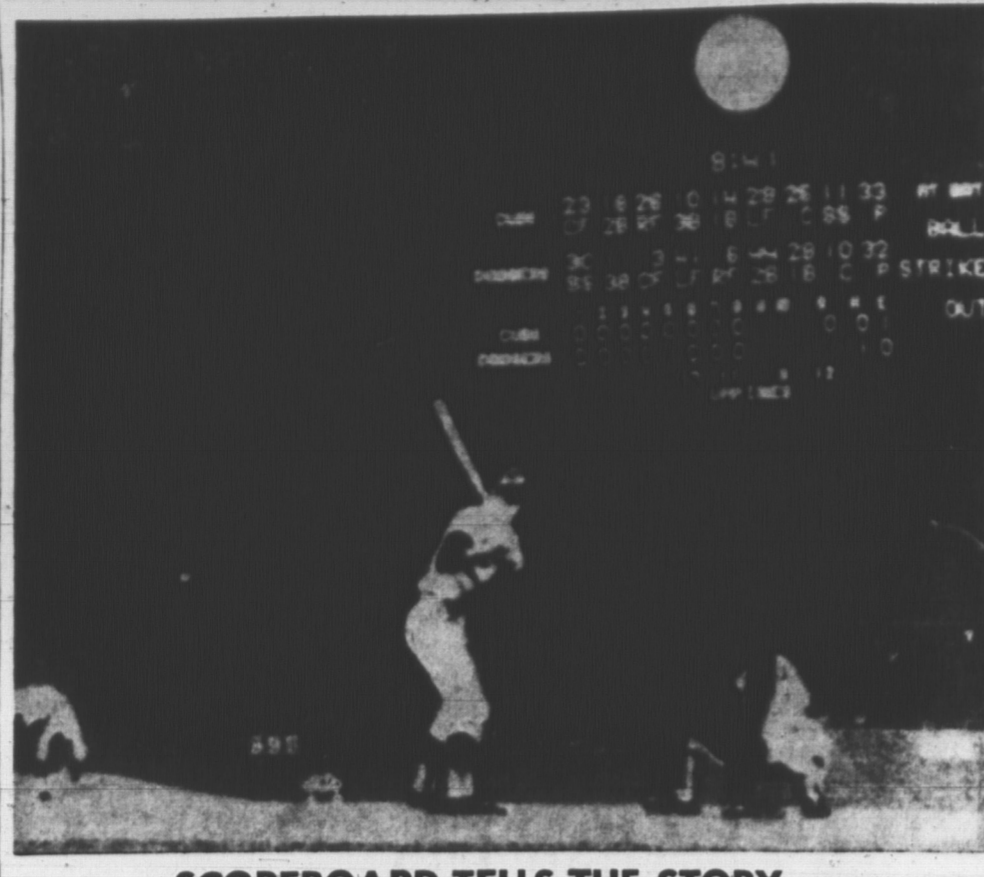

TORONTO (CP)—Saskatchewan Roughriders, spearheaded by the hard running of fullback George Reed, trounced Toronto Argonauts 24-9 Friday night in a Canadian Football League interlocking game before 20,497 fans.

The Roughriders were never headed in the dull contest as they handed the Argonauts their seventh consecutive defeat.

The result propelled Saskatchewan into second place, one point behind Calgary Stampeders, in the five-team Western conference. The Argonauts trail the four-team Eastern Conference.

Reed gave Saskatchewan its first touchdown on a 23-yard gallop six minutes into the opening quarter and spearheaded a rugged ground game throughout.

Halfback Gill Gray and quarterback Ron Lancaster added touchdowns while rookie import guard Jack Abenschan kicked three converts, two field goals and a single to complete the Roughriders' scoring.

Defensive halfback Dick Aldridge scored Toronto's only touchdown on a pass interception while Dave Mann added the final two points on singles.

Saskatchewan jumped ahead 14-1 in the opening quarter, led 21-8 at the half and 24-9 after three quarters.

The Roughriders added four unanswered points in the final 15 minutes.

Harold Ballard Praises Dyson

He knows how to give people hell and you've got to respect him because he's a practical man and knows what's going on."

The co-owner of the National Hockey League Toronto Maple Leafs had just heard Geoff Dyson tell a gathering of sportsmen—mainly men connected in some capacity with professional—what he thought of pro and amateur sports in Canada.

The 51-year-old Englishman, national coaching director of the Royal Canadian Legion's sports training plan, paid tribute to Canada's amateur athletes but he took a swipe at the pros, particularly hockey and basketball.

"I thought for sure he was going to give us one of those 'play-the-game boys' speeches, but I soon changed my mind about this guy."

"He knows his sport. He knows physical fitness and he certainly knows what is going on on this side of the Atlantic. You've got to respect him although I didn't entirely agree with him about pro hockey players not sticking to the rules."

"There are a few men when there's a little bit of animosity and if we have a real smoozle then the newspaper, radio and television guys start building up the return game, saying it could develop into a real wing-ding."

"I don't think I'd accept such a speech from some amateur officials in this country, but from Dyson you've got to listen because he knows what he is talking about," Ballard said.

That's the way this 51-year-old Englishman with the rosy red cheeks operates. He has been stepping on official toes for years, from 1947 when he was chief national coach of the Amateur Athletic Association in Britain.

He's a dynamic personality and, with the Legion, operates the biggest track and field coaching clinic in the world at Guelph, Ont. He brings in coaches from the U.S. and Europe and the annual clinic is set up simply, as he says, "to coach coaches, teach teachers and

Dodgers' 'Dandy Sandy' Hurls 4th Perfect Game

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The favorite story this year about Los Angeles Dodgers goes like this: "Did you hear about Sandy Koufax pitching a no-hitter last night?" "No, who won?"

There was no better time than Friday to repeat the story because the brilliant Koufax pitched a perfect no-hit, no-run game. He was the first man in baseball history to hurl four no-hitters. His other three were marred by bases on balls.

And the Dodgers won 1-0 over Chicago Cubs, to ruin a brilliant one-hitter by Bob Hendley.

The lone Dodger hit was a blooping double in the seventh by Lou Johnson which proved meaningless to Los Angeles but a crusher to Hendley, 26-year-old left hander.

DREW ONLY WALK It was Johnson in the fifth who drew the only walk issued by Hendley. Ron Fairly sacrificed Johnson to second. Johnson then stole third and came on home on a throw to left field by rookie catcher Chris Krug.

He was charged with an error and the Dodger run was unearned.

Johnson was the only player on either team to reach first base.

Koufax, 29-year-old left handed strikeout king, retired in order the 27 batters he faced. He struck out 14, the 79th time in his career he has fanned 10 or more batters in a game.

It was Sandy's 22nd victory of the season, and not just incidentally, he kept the Dodgers in the National League pennant race, one-half game behind San Francisco Giants.

Arthur Ashe Jr. Bombs Emerson

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP)—Arthur Ashe Jr., a scrawny Negro youngster from Los Angeles, bombed the world's top amateur player, Roy Emerson of Australia, into defeat 13-11, 6-4, 10-12, 6-2 Friday and shot into the men's semi-finals of the U.S. national tennis championships.

The 22-year-old student thrilled a West Side Tennis Club gallery of 11,000 with some of the most flashy stroke-making seen on the old centre court in years.

BC Meets Stamps For First Place

They meet tonight for the first time this season with that little piece of history in mind.

The weekend is bound to shake up conference standings. Stampeders could end up four points ahead of their nearest pursuer or locked with three other teams in a near-tossup for the lead.

Winnipeg Blue Bombers, who play the Eskimos in Edmonton tonight, could go home in first place or fourth.

Saskatchewan Roughriders were sure of at least a tie for second place if they won Friday night in an interlocking game at Toronto. If they also win Sunday afternoon in Montreal.

Stamps have 10 points, Winnipeg eight, Saskatchewan and B.C. seven each, and Eskimos four.

The game in Vancouver promises a crowd of at least 35,000, and a good chance of beating the Canadian Football League attendance record of 36,659, established when the same clubs met at the same stadium Sept. 7, 1963. Capacity has been enlarged to 37,500.

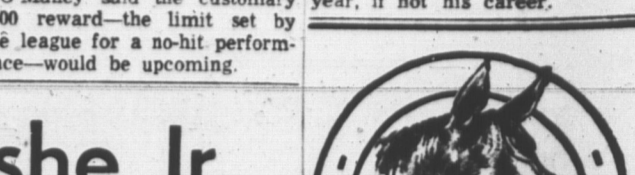
