S' side Firm Plans One-Day Project

SUMMERSIDE — A modern new home, constructed in one day, will be accomplished in Summerside this Friday, introducing a revolutionary method of home construction.

Pre-cut and partly pre-constructed at the plant of M.F. Schurman Ltd., all of the materials for the new home will leave the Schurman mill at 7 a.m. Friday morning for Beechwood Avenue, one block north of Victoria Road, in Summerside, where a full cement basement has been prepared.

By 5.30 p.m. building contractor Lester Linkletter expects to have progressed through the stages of floor laying, erecting walls and framework, shingling roof, installing windows and doors, and turning the key to lock up the newly build home for the night, about ten hours after starting its construction.

This new idea in home building is able to save a great deal of construction time and material waste, because everything used in the home is pre-cut for quick economical erection.
