

# Frizzell's Royals Crush S.D.U. Collegians 12-2

Saint Dunstan's University taking their debut last evening at the Charlottetown and District Hockey League, were crushed 12-2 by the Whitlock-coached Royals.

Alfie Carver paced the winners with a 5-goal effort. Angie Carroll, Carver's linemate, came up with three assists. Bellevance top forwardman for the Royals, scored a pair. Dunn and J. MacLeod each scored once.

The Royals took a 3-0 lead in the first period and increased their margin in the second period to 5-0 before the Collegians were able to dent the twines. First marker for S.D.U. squad came at 16:07 of the middle stanza when Manning slipped one past goalie Dillon unassisted.

Carver scored twice within the first three minutes of the final frame and Jim MacLeod came through at the 4:26 mark to make the score read 9-1 for the Royals.

Jackie Kane scored the final goal for the collegians 17 seconds later on a hard angle shot from about twenty feet out. The

Royals went on to score three more before the final whistle.

The Royals had Farmer Josey in their lineup last night. Josey on a year's suspension, for hitting referee Walter Lawlor, was given permission to play by officials of the Charlottetown and District Hockey League and is being allowed to play in the league till the 25th of January.

However, he has not been reinstated by the MAHA and would not be allowed to participate in the Maritime playdowns. His hockey future is still very uncertain.

# Hockey, Football Directors Have Yen To Fire Pilots

Professional hockey and football club directors have one thing in common: a yen to fire coaches.

In the last 25 years the six National Hockey League clubs have had 45 coaches. In the same period, the nine pro football teams in Canada—five in the West and four in the East—have had 69.

Fewest changes have been made by Detroit Red Wings of the NHL, mainly because Jack Adams became almost a permanent gate-opener with the team. He coached the Wings from 1927 to 1947, and only three others

have followed him in the job—Tommy Ivan, Jimmy Skinner and Sid Abel.

**BIG TURNOVER**  
 Chicago Black Hawks of the NHL lead both the pro hockey and football teams in coaches with 12 over the 25-year period. And Hawks have won the fewest Stanley Cup championships—two. They won the Cup in 1934 with Ottawa's Tommy Gorman as coach and in 1938 with Bill Stewart as pilot.

Montreal Canadiens have had eight coaches and Boston Bruins, New York Rangers and Toronto Maple Leafs seven each.

In football, Hamilton leads the list in coaches with 10. Following

with nine each are Ottawa, Saskatchewan Roughriders and Calgary Stampeders. Montreal and Winnipeg each has had eight. Edmonton six and Toronto and British Columbia Lions five each.

**BRUINS GROWL**  
 Red (Montreal Star) Fisher gives some interesting background to the action of Boston Bruins putting four forwards on waivers.

Fisher says the club has been "ripped to shreds" by dissension. It started shortly after Christmas when the Bruins lost 6-1 to Canadiens in Montreal and 5-3 to the Red Wings at Detroit. Many of the players, says Fisher, blamed

coach Matt Schmidt for their failings.

g Boston general manager Lynn Patrick heard of the mutterings, gathered the players around and told them to speak up.

"Nobody said a word," Fisher reports.

Before Patrick released the names of the players on waivers, Fisher had them in print—Norm Johnson, Earl Reibel, Real Chevrelis and Larry Regan.

# SPORTS FRONT

**SUMMERSIDE ACES** continue to show loads of power in this hockey league of ours. They've yet to taste defeat and by the look of things their first setback appears a long way off.

Their latest episode was a crushing 15-0 demoral of the Navy Tars who were beginning to show signs of causing real trouble in this loop. However, Wednesday night at Civic Stadium the Navy never got into the battle and the Aces really rubbed it in.

We talked to Frankie Roper yesterday and Frankie certainly had no alibi for the shellacking. He had the highest of praise for the play of the Aces who he claimed were flying all evening. His own boys couldn't get going at all and that was that. Frank didn't pan anybody only himself and he flatly said "I was awful".

**DESPITE THE MARGIN** of victory achieved by the Aces, Roper was talking with real confidence about the first time his Tars meet up with Summerside at the Sports Arena. You would hardly expect a coach to be showing any confidence after the lashing he had absorbed the night before. But Frankie was real optimistic and openly predicted his lads would take the measure of the westerners the next time they meet at the Sports Arena.

It's pretty hard to come out and agree with Roper on that statement but a glimpse back at the Navy performances makes one stop and think. The Tars were mauled by the Royals in mid-December, yet they came back last week and really slammed Sandy Frizzell's boys.

We think Summerside is a better club than the Navy. However, we can't for the life of us see them walloping the sailors the way they did. Navy has a lot of hard-working hockey players and such players usually get their share of glory. Perhaps when they get the Aces in Charlottetown they'll be able to make amends, at least to some extent.

**ONE THING ROPER** told us was identical with Buck Whitlock's statement of the other night. As we watched the Aces and Juniors battle here Tuesday, Buck said that the Summerside gang looked twice as good on Civic Stadium ice. Roper had the same comment. This would lead us to believe that Aces are going to be terrifically tough to handle in their own backyard. They looked good enough to us right in our yard the other night but Frank and Buck inform us we haven't seen anything yet.

Garrison Juniors will try tonight to bring an end to the Aces' victory string. This one is at Civic Stadium and once again the Steelemen will be heavy favourites to get home in front. However, in the Juniors they are meeting a squad that will skate with them all evening. Here Tuesday night, these same Juniors outplayed the Aces for the first twenty minutes and skated off with a 3-1 margin. Had the Juniors continued the same attack the rest of the way, Aces might well have suffered their first defeat.

Orin Carver's boys aren't heading west tonight with any ideas of losing this one. They still think they can handle the Aces and believe that tonight's as good a time as any to prove it. Summerside folks should really turn out for this one as the last time these teams met at Civic Stadium it was a bruising battle that the referees halted before the final siren went. That time there were more than 700 fans at the Stadium, so tonight you can bet the figure will top the 1000 mark.

**CHARLOTTETOWN** is at present working on its senior team for Maritime playdowns. This team will come to a great extent from the ranks of the Royals and the Navy. However Orin Carver, Merrill Pineau and Art Perry will be eligible since they can't qualify for the junior Art Perry in M.A.H.A. playoffs.

We understand the Aces will go senior as well and they may add their team before the January 5 registration date. An intermediate team is also to be registered from the capital city in addition to the Garrison Juniors.

Senior players around Charlottetown are starting to clamor for some exhibition tilts before they go into competition with the mainland. They feel they must have some games as a unit if they hope to get anywhere. Summerside could certainly oblige along this line and it would be good for both centres.

**SOME PERSONS** are of the opinion that the cream of Charlottetown hockey talent will be able to handle the men of Windy Steele. That may be so but it's going to be a really tough chore. These Aces have been working as a unit for quite some time and are going to be worthy opponents for the best that Charlottetown has to offer. We don't know Steele's feeling on the matter but we are going to make a guess that he feels his team can win the Island Senior crown.

We are not going to attempt to call an Island winner but we'll go this far. Unless the Charlottetown team gets several games together against tough opposition, they will be in for a real surprise when play for the Island crown rolls around. A few practices won't be enough to stop those fellows from the west. Perhaps they won't be stopped anyway, but whatever chance Charlottetown has depends on the amount of work the team gets as a unit.

This could be the best Island playoff in many a year.

**BOSTON BRUINS'** general manager Lynn Patrick has rallied to the side of goalie Don Simmons. He attributes the Bruins' recent slump to the fact that the team is "just giving away too many goals."

Simmons has been taking quite a riding from the Boston fans who naturally are growing impatient with the way things are rolling. But Patrick has come to the rescue of his goaltender and expresses himself in this manner:

"Our trouble is not in the nets. I wouldn't say Simmons couldn't have played a little better, but we will not change goalies. We're just giving away too many goals. That's the trouble."

We still think the Bruins will make the playoffs although they are skating on thin ice right now. We don't think the Detroit Red Wings will be participants in the semi-final round of Stanley Cup play and we are expecting the New York Rangers to watch this spring from the sidelines.

We know such a prediction will find plenty of opposition but wisely or not we are making it.

Oh, yes. We've been wrong before.

# HUNTERS CORNER January So Far Has Been A Really Chilly Month

January's icy grip on the province shows no appreciable sign of lessening. There has been no heavy snowfall of late but sudden blizzards and high winds have resulted in heavy drifting. Fox and rabbit hunters report snow is waist deep in the woods in places and around a foot and a half in others. It makes for heavy going for hounds, especially the short legged beagles, but many hunters are persisting in their efforts to find the bunnies and are bringing home enough for a tasty stew or pot-pie. The ground was bare this time last year and rabbits were white as the driven snow. They were sure caught with their landing gear down last season.

Quite a few rabbit hunters of my acquaintance are complaining that rabbits are scarce this winter. I asked one hunter what made him say that and he offered the following comment: "Last year we could shoot as many more in the same swamp. This year once we clean out a swamp or woodlot it stays cleaned out." I explained that there was a reason for this state of affairs. The winter of 1955-56 saw the rabbits coming back strong. It was a winter of normal hunting conditions and although the kill was heavy end of open season saw abundance of bunnies left for seed even after predation took its annual toll.

**JUST THE OPPOSITE**  
 1956-57 was just the opposite. Winter set in during Nov., and held on until its last road blocking blizzard on May 3rd. Hunting pressure was practically nil and even predators went hungry. Rabbits went underground as it were. . . they burrowed under snow-covered thickets and didn't have to move out for days at a time unless it was for exercise. 1957-58 saw a different picture. A rabbit was just about as conspicuous as a person would be standing in the middle of a bald head.

ed prairie wrapped in a white sheet. It may be a long time before the rabbit kill last season will be duplicated. Farm boy shot back loads in a few hours without the aid of a dog. As one teen age nimrod remarked: "All you had to do was kick a bush and a rabbit would hop out!"

Last season every covert, even the extensive back woods sections, were crowded to their doors. Once a small woodlot or swamp was shot out there were others ready to take their places. This season the situation is reversed. When a rabbit has food and sufficient elbow room they stay put. Some hunters claim that we have no scarcity of rabbits this winter. This is true up to a point. . . the parties who go to a different area every time out are the ones who fetch it. . . the most rabbits although noody is bringing home too many right now because hunting conditions are all in favour of the bunnies. Some hunters I know cover both Queens and Kings counties in a season.

**NOT SO MANY**  
 We haven't got nearly so many rabbits as we had last season. We were certainly over populated last year. Farmers tell me woodlots, extensive ones, where rabbits were thick as flies last winter they are so scarce this winter one sees only the odd track. In other areas where hunting was only fair last season a good population is present this winter. The question at the moment is: "How much hunting can rabbits stand and yet hold their own?" It is this columnist's opinion that if this season was a repetition of last the rabbit population would be at a very low ebb come January 31st, the date on which the season closes.

Last season the tread was to shoot as many rabbits as possible and the kill was regulated in the middle of a bald head.
