Unbeaten Teams Topple In Saturday's Baseball Games

(By The Associated Press) Things shook down a bit in the major leagues Saturday as the last two teams took their first defeats of the young season.

In the American League, Chicago White Sox dropped their first game with an awful crash, losing 15-1 to Kansas City Athletics who got 13 runs in the second inning after two were out.

Eighteen batters produced 10 singles, a triple, two doubles and two walks in the big inning. Art Ditmar hurled a one-hitter.

In the National League, Milwaukee lost its first, 6-5 to St. Louis. Wally Moon's two-out single in the seventh scored Stan Musial from second with the winning run.

Pittsburgh's Bob Friend, who lost a close one to New York Giants in his season opener, hurled a three-hitter as Pirates

downed Brooklyn 3-1. Friend gave up only a single, double and Charley Neal's homer while Dale Long and Frank Thomas homered for the Pirates, Thomas with a man on.

Jimmy King's single with the bases loaded in the 11th brought Chicago Cubs their second straight win over Cincinnati, 3-2.

In the American League, New York Yankees blew an 8-0 lead, then came from behind to beat Boston 14-10 in a three-hour, 44-minute marathon. The Red Sox had a 10-9 lead in the eighth but the Yankees came back with five runs, Eddie Robinson singing in what proved to be the winner in his first appearance of the season.

Catcher Ed Fitzgerald led an 11-hit Washington assault with three as the Senators defeated Baltimore 8-4. Detroit edged Cleve-

Former Great Athlete Dies

MONTREAL (CP)—Jean Pusie, rollicking athlete of a score of years ago, died Saturday in hospital of a heart ailment. He was 43.

A former player with Montreal Canadiens and New York Rangers of the National Hockey League, Pusie's showmanship performances became widely known and relished in other fields of sport as well, in both Canada and the United States.

He became a professional wrestler and boxer—always willing to challenge anybody any time—and had a fling at semi-pro baseball and lacrosse.

The colorful young giant, who was six feet tall and weighed around 200 pounds, was generally conceded to make up in tempestuousness and eccentricities what he lacked in athletic finesse and ability.

Little was heard of him in recent years in Montreal, where he had been living. He was taken to Royal Victoria Hospital Thursday night and his condition there was considered virtually hopeless.

The stretch-running roan son of Eight Thirty was beaten 2 1/2 lengths by Golf Ace, a non-derby eligible, in the 1 1/4-mile \$61,000 Wood Memorial at Jamaica Saturday.

But almost before the last of the field of eight three-year-olds had finished the race, Eddie Arcaro lodged a claim of four against Tony Desposito, who was up on a golf ace from the Winding Way Farm. He claimed Golf Ace carried Head Man wide as the Whitney colt made his bid for the lead in eighth of a mile from home.

Harness Horse Owner Dies

Hill was one of Maine's first automobile dealers. He also manufactured baseball bats at one time and sold his products to big league players.
