

Ship News.

The Schooner *Vetus*, from this Port, bound to Plymouth, was driven on shore on the Indian Rocks, near the Wood Islands, on the night of the 23d inst., and is a total wreck. She is advertised to be sold for the benefit of all concerned.

The Brig *Yarrow*, from Rustico, bound to Richibucto, to finish loading, lost both her masts, about 40 miles off the North Cape of this Island, in a gale of wind, on Friday, the 24th instant—sails, rigging, &c., all going by the board. She drifted about, at the mercy of the wind and waves, until Monday the 27th, when she lost one of her anchors and chains, near the North Cape—both having been dropped to prevent her going on shore—and during the day she drifted down to Cascumpec, when she lost the other anchor and chain, and drove on shore near Cascumpec Harbour, and is a total wreck.

The Captain of the *Yarrow* spoke the Schooner *Waterloo*, of this Island, off the North Cape, and wished to be taken off the wreck, but the wind blowing very hard at the time, the *Schr.* was afraid to approach her, and proceeded on. The *Yarrow* belonged to Messrs. J. & W. McGill of this town.

Am. *Schr.* *Aranda*, Ryan from Belfast, Maine, was cast away at Souris beach, on the 31st. ult.—is a perfect wreck.—Crew saved.
