INQUEST BEFORE CORONER McLEOD.

The Investigation Postponed.

MYSTERY NOT YET SOLVED.

The body of Mr. Alfred McGregor, who disappeared so mysteriously on the night of Friday, May 18th, was found yesterday evening, about six p. m., at the head of Pownal Wharf.

JOHN ANDERSON, (sworn)—Was well acquainted with Mr. McGregor. The last time I saw him was about 7 o'clock the night of his disappearance, on Friday, the 18th ult.

To the Jury—He was his usual self. I am sure it was about 7 o'clock in the evening. He was coming off the slip at the time. I am pretty sure he came from Southport.

DONALD McLEACHERN, (sworn)—I saw Alfred McGregor about nine o'clock on the night of Friday, 18th ult. I did not hear he was missing until Tuesday, May 29th.

CYRUS V. McGREGOR, (sworn)—I am proprietor of Osborne House. I knew the deceased well. I saw him last the Monday previous to his disappearance.

MICHAEL BEAGAN, (sworn)—I saw the body between the bow of steamship "Carroll" and the boat "Eureka" floating in the water. My younger brother James was the first to see it.

MARSHAL FLYNN, (sworn)—I searched the body of deceased, and found on his person a silver watch (the time on which was sixteen minutes to eleven), a black guard, and a sum of money (amounting to \$21.12).

To the Jury—I know nothing about a hat found a few days ago only from rumor. The Coroner postponed further investigation until seven o'clock this evening.

The Shooting of Morrison at Shediac.

AN INQUEST HELD.

Evidence of Miss Annie Carr and Dr. Harrison.

THE CAUSE OF DEATH.

An inquest to enquire into the death of T. Morrison, baggage master on the Shediac accommodation train, who was shot at Shediac on Tuesday last, began on the 6th, inst.

To the Jury—None of the men had been in before that day, or for a week previous except one Thomas McGinity. The whole crowd of men who came to the house appeared to be drunk.

George A. Harrison, M. D., sworn; I examined the body of deceased. On examination found three wounds, one between the third and fourth ribs.

Joseph A. Leger, M. D., also gave evidence confirming Dr. Harrison's evidence.
