Preparations For Summit Talks Still Up In Air

MOSCOW (AP)—Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko called in the ambassadors of the three Western powers on Monday and handed them a new Soviet note. Diplomatic sources said the note left preparations for a summit conference still up in the air. U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn E. Thompson told reporters after a 30-minute talk with Gromyko that the situation on summit talks remained unchanged. As the situation stands now the two sides have not even begun to talk about the preliminaries. Gromyko's note followed the West's rejection last Saturday of a Soviet proposal to include Czechoslovakia and Poland in pre-summit discussions. The West also agreed, reluctantly, to continue the ambassadorial talks on the basis of individual meetings. Ambassador Maurice Dejean of France left Monday's meetings with Gromyko. Thompson followed and Sir Patrick Reilly of Britain was last. Russian leader Nikita Khrushchev initiated the campaign for a summit conference last Nov. 6 in a speech to the Supreme Soviet. He said at that time: "We should like a high-level meeting of representatives of capitalist and socialist countries to take place so as to reach agreement... about the exclusion of war... to stop the cold war and the armaments race and to establish relations among states on the basis of coexistence."

Dies Following Transplant

BOSTON (AP)—Mrs. Gladys Lowman, 31, of Franklin, Ohio, who received a transplanted kidney from a child April 7 in an effort to substitute for the loss of her only kidney, died Monday. Peter Bent Brigham Hospital. The transplant was the first of its kind performed. The technique was designed to restrict the antibody reaction which normally attacks transplants between non-related individuals. Several transplants between identical twins have been made successfully at the hospital. The transplanted kidney had been obtained from a child who was suffering hydrocephalus, in which a normal kidney is removed as part of the treatment. Hydrocephalus has been known as "water on the brain."

Ingrid Has No Plans To Marry

LONDON (AP)—Actress Ingrid Bergman expects to be in Britain most of the summer and has no plans to marry Lars Schmidt, Swedish millionaire publisher, an official at her studio said Monday. He was commenting on a London Evening News report that Miss Bergman, estranged wife of Italian producer Roberto Rossellini, would marry in France as soon as her Mexican divorce comes through. "Nothing to it," said the studio official. "Miss Bergman has no plans. She has no divorce and is not seeking one in Mexico or anywhere else." Rossellini, the official recalled, is trying to have his marriage to Miss Bergman annulled in Italy, where divorce is not possible.
