PREPARE DREDGE — Employees of Dredge 115 have returned on board following the winter season to prepare the dredge for summer work. The dredge was located at Montague during the winter after having been engaged in dredging out the Montague River.

DEMOLISH FLUE — Workmen have been busy engaged during the past few days tearing down the top portion of the unused flue at the Montague Post Office. It was thought advisable to remove the top since the mortar had been eroded to a large extent. It is understood that the flue will be capped, the cap being expected momentarily from Charlottetown.

THIRD SPECIAL SERVICE — Dr. A. D. MacKenzie presided at the third service held this week in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague, last evening, sponsored by the King's County Ministerial Association. There was a very large attendance of members and adherents from the four Protestant churches of the town. The service of praise was led by Trinity United Church choir, with Mrs. Howard Vickerson presiding at the organ. Special selections included a solo "Only Shadows" by Mr. John Bears, and a hymn "Lead Me To Calvary" by the choir. The hymns were "Take Up Thy Cross", "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross" and "Jesus Keep Me Near The Cross". The Scripture lesson was read by Rev. F. N. Young, and Mr. W. D. Johnston led in prayer. Rev. D. A. Campbell, New London, gave the address, taking for his text St. Luke 23:34.

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said that in case of a fire there was always a suspicion regarding electrical equipment and asked if the Department felt the inspection were rigid enough. He recalled the fire at Falconwood Hospital several years ago and the recent one at the Harwood Apartments. He thought the latter might have caused a great loss of life had it occurred at an hour other than the daytime. Hon. A. W. Matheson said the main thing to be concerned with was the reliability of the inspectors and in this case he personally knew all the inspectors and said they were 100 per cent efficient.

Reinspection Necessary Mr. William Hughes, Fifth Kings thought all buildings should be re-inspected periodically and remarked that many of the joints were only wrapped instead of being soldered first and their wrapping was not always capable of handling the load imposed on them as it had been noticeable that during the past war it had not been possible at all times to get switches big enough.

On the item of "travelling expenses" in Fish and Game work Hon. Keir Clark brought a laugh to the House when he asked if these were travelling expenses for the deer imported as he understood they had moved around. Hon. Mr. Cullen said that until Mr. Spurgeon Jenkins had been appointed by the Government last year there had been few licenses sold. After he went on the job there was "a flood" of requests for them.

Premier Jones stated that in order to get reforestation going it would be necessary to establish a sub station in some place where there was sandy soil and a brook running through the station. The station at Southport, he said, had heavy soil. He suggested that perhaps the Rotary Club and other organizations might help the work along by buying a few acres and planting trees. The City of Charlottetown might do the same thing, he said. He said that for reforestation purposes the Island cedar was slow growing and for that reason the European larch was considered much more suitable.

No Money Made Mr. Cullen said the Government did not make any money on its farm equipment machinery for ditching or other work because they had to do so much work for the schools. He noted that those in charge of school districts were usually slow in making payment for such work. Regarding potato warehouses Mr. Cullen said they had been all lined this spring when they were cleaned out. He thought if the Agricultural Council wanted to make resolutions about warehouses they should invite a member of his department to attend their sittings and be informed about the warehouses.

Dr. MacMillan inquired as to how much damage the deer had done to property. Premier Jones admitted there had been some damage but he considered it negligible and said the Province could support a deer population of 10,000 and the damage they would do would never be noticed. Any way we can easily get rid of them in a few weeks if necessary.

Several speakers including Premier Jones Hon. Mr. Darby and Mr. Bell agreed that the forest nursery was making a real improvement in conditions and the results could be seen all over the Province.

Commends Staff During the discussion of estimates for the Department of Public Works and Highways, Hon. Dougald MacKinnon, the Minister, said he was not afraid to state that it had a staff not excelled by that of any other Province in Canada. Any of its members could leave here and get far more money elsewhere, he said.

The Minister said the road engineers were just on a mileage basis in the operation of their cars. Asked by Mr. Bell if the Government supplied the cars the Minister said the men paid for their own. He admitted that his department might finance the purchase but the owners then had to make regular monthly payments. He got this own car free. He stated that all Government cars were purchased by his department and at present the Government had about 70 car accounts.

Mr. Forrest Phillips, the Speaker of the House who was sitting with the private members while the Legislature was in committee, asked if the proposed expenditure of the department of \$355,000 for highways maintenance had been broken down into County amounts. Hon. Mr. MacKinnon said the work was allocated on the basis of total road mileage and the population. He said it worked out to about \$30,000 to \$36,000 per district and he said he tried to make it as fair as possible. He thought this year it would be \$165,000 for each of Queens and Prince Counties and \$150,000 for Kings.

Essential Rights Mr. William Hughes, Fifth Kings, said the people of this country were entitled to certain rights because they are citizens of Canada and he thought the Federal Government should furnish any money necessary to guarantee those rights. He said it was his belief that the thing should apply to the district level. He had heard members asking how many cars were in a certain district or what the population was, but Mr. Hughes said those points were irrelevant as all the money received is for the Province as a whole and not for one particular district.

He believed that if one section could not supply its own needs then it was the duty of the Province to assure that the standard of living there was the same as elsewhere. He reminded the members that "every man in this House is in a real sense a representative of the members of the other party as well as of the people who elected him."

Mr. George Saville, Fifth Kings, dealing with the estimates for gravelled roads said he would like the department to set amounts for each district. However, Mr. W. F. A. Stewart, First Queens, disagreed as he said it could not be allotted on a district basis as there were some districts in Prince County where roads could be gravelled for 80 cents per yard because they were near a gravel supply. Other districts would need \$2.00.

He expressed the belief that when the people got used to shale on the roads they would think it was better than the gravel. Mr. Bell felt that the amounts (Continued on Page 15)
