

Local and Other Items.

J. E. BOYD, Esq., left for Picton this morning. SENATOR HOWLAN, of Alberton, is at the Rankin. J. C. UNERRAY, Esq., M. P. P., is visiting Charlottetown. TRICKETT has arrived in England. He looks none the worse for his journey. SERGEANT MACDOUGALL won a prize at Wimbledon on the 24th. See telegrams. ONE case of drunkenness was disposed of by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon. THE familiar form of I. C. Hall, Esq., is again seen on our streets—looking well, too. PRIMITIVE RUSTICIAN makes a pretty fair attempt. He is, however, just a little "wide of the mark." THE case of Jane Hayden and another vs. James McDonald is still before the Supreme Court. KING'S CO., N. B., had a breach of promise case the other day, in which a fickle farmer was obliged to pay \$400. SMITH, of Halifax, has decided to challenge Riley, of Saratoga, for a three mile single scull race for \$1,000 a side. IN the poorhouse at Milwaukee is one Joseph Daws, who before the war was reported to be worth over \$3,000,000. ST. PAUL'S Sunday School Picnic will be held on Wednesday next, at Shaw's Wharf, instead of Tuesday, the 3rd. See advertisement. A. C. MACDONALD, Esq., M. P., and Lawrence Kitchin, Esq., M. L. C., are in town. Duncan Crawford, Esq., M. P. P., was in town yesterday. GREECE evidently means business. In addition to the decree for mobilization, she has obtained a loan of £600,000 at Paris, and another of £2,000,000 is being negotiated. THE exports of grain from Montreal for the week ending the 17th inst., were 400 per cent. greater than from Boston, and one-third of the quantity exported from New York. The amount was over one million bushels. WE understand that rates at the Seaside Hotel, Rustico Beach, have been reduced to \$1.75 per day and \$8 per week, to continue to the close of the season. With the high reputation of the Seaside Hotel, and those low rates, a very large patronage should be secured. THE grant made by the Canadian Government the alleviation of the Irish distress, and which is being devoted towards permanently ameliorating the condition of the Irish fishermen, has been allocated to the extent of £18,671—viz. for fishing materials, \$3,110; for piers, \$10,341; and for boat-slips, £220. A ST. JOHN GIRL'S SUICIDE.—A Boston paper says:—"A letter was found this morning in Brighton, purporting to have been written by Kittie Ke nie, of St. John, N. B., in which she states that she has committed suicide, her lover having left her. She warns all young girls against night walking." BRADLAUGH is not out of the toils yet, one of the largest and wealthiest merchants in the city of London having declared that he will expend from £10,000 to £50,000 if necessary, to test the legality of his affirming, and his right to sit in Parliament. The matter is in the hands of some legal luminaries of considerable repute, who are now preparing the documents to enter an action in the law courts. THE Secretary of the Provincial Rifle Association—Mr. E. F. Longworth—is in receipt of the Bronze and Silver Medals presented by the Governor General and Princess Louise, for competition by our Provincial marksmen. Both medals are beautifully finished. On one side are the heads in profile of His Excellency and the Princess, while on the opposite are the Royal and Argyle Arms, with "Palmarum qui meruit Ferat." We understand that the Marquis has requested that the winners of the medals shall forward to him their photographs. A HEAVY SQUALL, accompanied by rain, hail, thunder and lightning, passed over this city on Wednesday evening at 6.30 o'clock. The rain fell heavier than for years. Several trees were uprooted by the squall, while the rain and hail did serious injury to gardens in the city. Rocky Point Ferry Boat, which had a large party of excursionists on board, was out during the passing of the squall and rain. Fortunately no damage was done other than the thorough drenching which the party received. We are informed that the lightning descended the chimney of a dwelling in the west end of the city, and destroyed a register grate.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, July 27.

The schooner Matilda Hopewell, of Sydney, C. B., from Boston for Halifax, with mineral cargo, went ashore during a dense fog this morning at Chebogue Point, Yarmouth. Cargo will be saved, but vessel will probably be a total loss.

The anniversary of the death of Archbishop Connolly occurred to-day. There was an office and high mass for the repose of his soul at St. Mary's Cathedral this morning at 9 o'clock. Archbishop Hannan presided. The services were very impressive.

TORONTO, July 27.

The Globe this morning contains the following special cablegram:—

LONDON, July 26.—In the shooting for the consolidated prizes Major Oats won £10, Pte. Graham, Sergt. McDougall and Pte. Walters, £1 each. The distribution of prizes took place to-day.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, July 27.

John Diggs, negro, who brutally outraged Mrs. James Tschiffely on Saturday night, near Dainstown, Ind., was taken from Rockville jail at four o'clock this morning, by fifty men, and hanged.

PHILADELPHIA, July 27.

A Greenburg despatch says that at a preliminary hearing yesterday, twelve of the circus men involved in the Burkett girl's abduction outrage were held for trial. The remainder were discharged.

NEW YORK, July 27.

In Brooklyn last night, Edward Hogan quarrelled with his wife and rushed for her with a razor. His sister, Mrs. John Burns, stepped between them, when Hogan nearly severed one of the latter's arms below the elbow. Hogan ran into the street and met some young men, one of whom, John Thompson, asked him if he assaulted a woman, and Hogan retaliated by fatally wounding Thompson. Hogan was arrested.

BRINGTON, Mass, July 27.

Oliver Grover, the missing market gardener from Halifax, was, this afternoon, seen coming out of the woods on King street Rockland. Seeing that he was observed, he immediately took again to the woods. A party was organized and went in search of him. The theory of his insanity is well established.

NEW YORK, July 27.

Samuel J. Tilden telegraphed to-day to the National Democratic headquarters signifying his willingness to preside at Hancock and English's ratification meeting at the Academy of Music to-morrow night. Dr. Tanner is still in the same condition—pulse 84, temperature 80, respiration 14, weight 130 pounds.

PANAMA, July 27.

Latest dates from Lima by telegraph via Payto to July 4th, were as follows:—"Chilians will bombard Lima, and have notified the diplomatic body to that effect. A notification has also been conveyed to foreign ministers intimating that the Pacific Steam Navigation Company's steamers will be permitted to enter Callao harbor up to July 8th, and receive all foreign families and women and children who desire to leave the city. The Chilean admiral threatened that Luna, when taken, will be given up to destruction and ravages of troops. The Peruvians are preparing to give their women, children and household valuables an asylum. Tarma, a little town situated beyond the impenetrable ramparts of the Cordilleras, has been selected as the place. In view of the critical state of affairs existing in Lima, Dictator Pirola has decreed that every man between sixteen and sixty years of age, excepting the clergy, the medical profession and a few employees of government officers, has to present himself in uniform and to drill every day. All foreigners are invited to form themselves into corps to maintain order and protect property in the event of the city being left at any time without the usual guardians of the peace. As an example of the spirit which animates the people, it may be stated that the Archbishop of Lima has placed the treasure of the church at the disposal of government to be used in the service of the country."

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, July 27.

In the House of Lords this evening Granville introduced Compensation for disturbance in Ireland Bill, and fixed second reading of Bill for Monday. Earl Grey will lead opposition to Bill.

LONDON, July 28.

The Breton cotton operatives who recently threatened to strike held a secret meeting last night. It is understood that they decided not to strike.

LONDON, July 27.

The Princess Beatrice, in Royal yacht Osborne, will meet the ex-Empress Eugene off Osborne to-day and convey her to Southampton.

Earl Spencer, Lord President of the Council, will have charge of the Compensation Bill in the House of Lords.

In the Commons, the Compensation Bill was last night read a third time and passed.

The Times says:—"The Compensation Bill has fallen into disrepute through its inherent vices of structure and character. It would be well for the government to abstain from raising a question of this kind until the Royal Commission has reported on the subject. In the meantime vague intimations of coming changes engender more alarm and alienate more support than all efforts of Conservative oratory."

Very serious damage has been done to the crops throughout Worcestershire, Shropshire and parts of Staffordshire by heavy rains on Sunday and Monday.

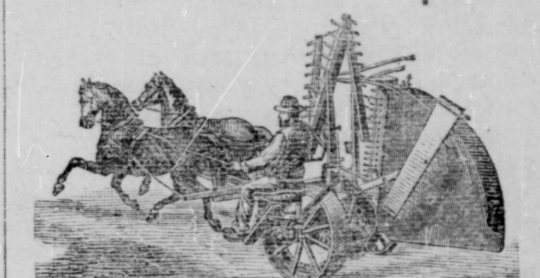
