

**ANOTHER LINK IN THE CHAIN**

**Of Uncle Sam's Territory.**

**THE LADRONE ISLANDS CAPTURED BY CAPTAIN GLASS.**

Spanish People Were Taken Completely by Surprise.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—The steamer Doric from Hong Kong brings the following from the correspondent of the Associated Press at Manila under date of July 1st:

Another link has been added to the chain of territory which connects the United States with their newly-acquired foreign possessions in the Pacific Ocean. On June 21, Captain Glass, of the United States steamer Charleston, captured the Ladrone Islands, took the governor general, his staff and the entire military force prisoners, and raised the Stars and stripes over the ruins of the Spanish forts of Santa Cruz in the harbor of San Luis, of Para. It was a bloodless victory, for the Spanish, not yet having heard of the war between their country and the United States, were taken completely taken by surprise and surrendered the islands, their arms and themselves without the slightest resistance.

Its inhabitants, who number ten thousand, are hospitable, peaceable and law abiding people, only too anxious to throw off the Spanish yoke, yet perfectly willing to shoulder a perfectly less galling one. On June 28th, a strange steamer appeared in the horizon. The Charleston was immediately cleared for action. A convoy tell into line and preparations were made for giving the strange steamer a warm welcome should she prove to be hostile. She proved to be the U. S. S. Baltimore. At 2 p. m., on June 30th, the Baltimore led the way into Manila harbor and three hours later the fleet anchored under the wing of the flagship Olympia, within a few miles of the wrecks of the Spanish squadron which had been annihilated by Rear Admiral Dewey two months ago.

**THE BANK OF ENGLAND ROBBED.**

**A Remarkably Daring Robbery.**

**BAG CONTAINING ONE THOUSAND POUNDS IN GOLD**

Taken From the Bank's Counter in the Afternoon.

LONDON, Aug 3.—A remarkably daring robbery from the counter of the Bank of England took place shortly after one o'clock on a recent afternoon. It appears that a clerk in the employ of Coutts' Bank went to the Bank with an order for 3,000 pounds, which he was instructed to bring away with him in three bags, each to contain 1,000 pounds in gold. There were many people in the bank when the order was given. The gold was taken out in the usual way and put into three canvas bags—the bags always used for this purpose—and placed on the counter in front of Messrs Coutts' messenger. At this moment the young man's attention was diverted and he turned his head. The movement was only momentary, but in this short space of time somebody had removed one of the bags and disappeared. The clerk first of all thought that only two bags had been handed to him, so quickly had the other one been snatched away, but he was soon convinced that a few seconds before three bags had been placed before him. No one noticed any unusual movement in the bank, nor was any suspicious-looking person observed.

News of the theft was immediately conveyed to the city police station in Old Jewry, and a message was also sent to Scotland Yard. Two detectives were instantly told off to make inquiries into the case, but with absolutely no clue to work upon, they have an extremely difficult task before them. The theft was evidently a very cleverly planned one, and it is thought that Messrs Coutts' clerk had been very closely shadowed by the robber or one of his confederates. They had, it is thought, by carefully watching Messrs. Coutts' bank become aware of the fact that at certain times on certain days it was the habit to send to the Bank of England for large sums of money in gold. They watched their chance, and so managed with marvelous coolness and skill to bring off this successful coup.

**MATTERS REGARDING SPANISH FINANCES**

**Difference of Five Million Pesetas.**

**CIVIL GOVERNMENT OF MADRID TEMPORALRY INCREASED.**

The Estrangement Between General Garcia and General Shafter.

LONDON, August 3.—The Madrid correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: "The July Bourse liquidation shows difference of 5,000,000 pesetas. Several jobbers failed and one committed suicide. The Carlist organ, El Correo Espanol which had been suppressed, reappeared yesterday and expresses undying devotion to the cause. The civil government of Madrid has been temporarily increased by a thousand recruits, and it is about to commence its military marches throughout the peninsula beginning with Catalonia, Aragon and the Basque provinces. Five hundred dockers have been dismissed at Ferrol, owing to slackness of trade.

NEW YORK, August 3.—President Estrada Palma of the Cuban Junta when questioned to-day about the estrangement between Gen. Garcia and Gen. Shafter, said: "There is no danger that Cubans will permit a slight misunderstanding of one of their own countrymen—even of a General—with an American to affect the successful issue of the campaign. I know that Gen Garcia, as well as all the Cubans, have too deep a sense of gratitude towards the United States to harbor slight or fanciful wrongs against their benefactors."

**SPANISH AND FRENCH REFUGEES**

**Landed at New York Recently.**

**ALL BUT TWO WELL SUPPLIED WITH MONEY**

Where Money is Useless in Purchasing the Necessaries of Life.

NEW YORK, Aug 3.—Twenty nine Spanish and French refugees from Havana and Cardenas landed yesterday from the Norwegian steamer Fridtjof Nansen, from Sagua La Grande. All but two were well supplied with money. Petrona Rivas with his family fled from Cuba on the Fridtjof Nansen.


"Money of which there is no security in Havana is useless in purchasing the necessaries of life," said Senor Rivas.

The only meat to be had in Havana before the Nansen left Sagua, on July 26, was from the carcasses of horses and dogs. Every day an average of ten or twelve persons died in the streets from starvation. Highway robbery and burglary are prevalent everywhere in the city.

"The famous Englatta hotel, together with other hotels, has been obliged to close its doors. The landlord could not secure provisions. Fully 25 per cent of the big stores have closed up."

Senor Rivas said that all these concentrations are not dead, but he wonders how any survive. On Thursday night they still have music in the parks, while the people are starving all around. Bread has risen to 28 cents per pound while horse flesh is selling for a dollar per pound.
