

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

CURE FOR CHOLERA INFANTUM.—Use injection of pure warm water.

A little kerosene added to stove polish improves the lustre. Apply while the iron is warm.

TO STOP VOMITING.—One teaspoonful of lemon juice, little water and sugar; then add a little soda; drink while foaming.

TO CLEAN TINWARE.—Take one teaspoonful saltpetre to three pints of water. Wet a brush in it and shake it up under the side of the leaves; it is also good for vines.

CURE FOR INFLAMMATION OF THE BOWELS.—Take malt yeast and thicken with wheat flour or powdered charcoal, spread on a cloth and apply the paste to the skin; it will remove the inflammation.

The white of an egg, into which a piece of alum about the size of a walnut has been stewed until it forms a jelly, is a capital remedy for sprains. It should be laid over the sprain upon a piece of lint, and be changed as often as it comes dry.

TO MAKE HARD SOAP FROM SOFT.—Take seven pounds of good soft soap, four pounds of sal-soda, two ounces borax, one ounce hartshorn, one half-pound resin, so be dissolved in twenty-two quarts of water and boiled about twenty minutes.

DANDILIONS.—They are ripe for use before they blossom. Cut off the leaves, pick over carefully, wash in several waters, boil one hour, drain well, add salted boiling water, and boil two hours; when done turn into a colander and drain; season with butter, and more salt if needed, and cut with a knife; or boil with a piece of salt pork, omitting the butter in the dressing.

TO KEEP MEAT FRESH IN HOT WEATHER.—For a five pound piece of meat, take a three gallon stone crock; have some pans of skim milk that is turning sour, just getting thick; put some of the milk in the crock; then put in the meat, and put in milk till it covers the meat; now turn an earthen dish or plate bottom up on the meat to hold it down; fill the crock with the milk; tie a cloth over the top and sit in a cool place; it will keep five or six days in the hottest weather. When wanted for use wash thoroughly in water and cook in any manner desired.

RHEUMATISM WINE.—Pound the stalks and press out the juice. To one quart of juice add one quart of water. Put the water through the pumice and in that way press out all the juice; add one pound of sugar to one of liquid, and put it in a close jar and let it ferment and settle for several weeks; then adding one spoonful of pure alcohol to one quart of the wine to prevent a second fermentation. When one year old it will be an excellent medicine. If two pounds of sugar are added over and above the rule, it will be richer and preserved better.

LEAVES OF RHUBARB.—Ever since I tasted in Brussels, seven years ago, a delicious dish which can be made from rhubarb leaves. I have urged upon all my friends to try it, and it has been almost universally appreciated by those who like spinach, as, when properly prepared, rhubarb leaves resemble that delicate vegetable very closely, only possessing a slightly more acid flavour, which, however, is most refreshing. To prepare the leaves for the table, the younger ones only should be used; after taking out the ribs and coarse parts the leaves should be treated similarly to spinach. After boiling, they must be passed through a fine sieve, and then served up either with a little butter on toast or with rich brown gravy.

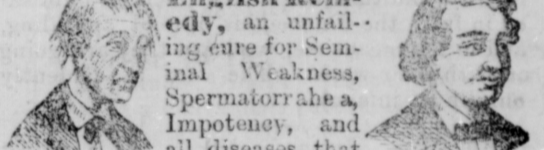
