**ATTENTION VOTERS**

**CANADA ELECTION ACT**

Section 47 (1) Every employee who is a qualified elector shall, while the polls are open on polling day at an election, have three consecutive hours for the purpose of casting his vote; and if the hours of his employment do not allow for such three consecutive hours, his employer shall allow him such additional time for voting as may be necessary to provide the said three consecutive hours; no employer shall make any deduction from the pay of any such employee nor impose upon or exact from him any penalty by reason of absence from his work during such consecutive hours; the additional time for voting above referred to shall be granted at the convenience of the employer.  
(2) This section extends to railway companies and their employees, except such employees as are actually engaged in the running of trains and to whom such time cannot be allowed without interfering with the manning of the trains.  
(3) Any employer who, directly or indirectly, refuses, or by intimidation, undue influence, or in any other way, interferes with the granting to any elector in his employ, of the consecutive hours of voting, as in this section provided, is guilty of an illegal practice and of an offence against this Act punishable on summary conviction as provided in this Act.

**Petroleum Spokesman Speaks "Don't Orate" On Education And Industry Speakers Told**

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP)—Hit 'em between the eyes with your first sentence.  
Have a purpose and stick to it.  
Don't orate; just use "amplified conversation." Stand up, speak up, shut up.  
These are tips from the spray, 79-year-old founder of an organization whose 75,000 members and 500,000 former members around the world never have to apologize: "Unaccustomed as I am to public speaking . . ."  
NOW 2,500 CLUBS  
Dr. Ralph C. Smedley organized the first toastmasters club in 1904. Toastmasters International is a non-profit corporation whose affiliated clubs have mushroomed from 250 to 2,500 in the last 12 years.  
Headquarters here, with a paid staff of 35, is a nerve centre that mails 3,000,000 letters, manuals and programs annually to clubs as far away as Greenland, Hong Kong and South Africa. New clubs are being formed at the rate of two a day. This month a zone conference is being held in Winnipeg. The growth of Toastmasters in conditions of the community.

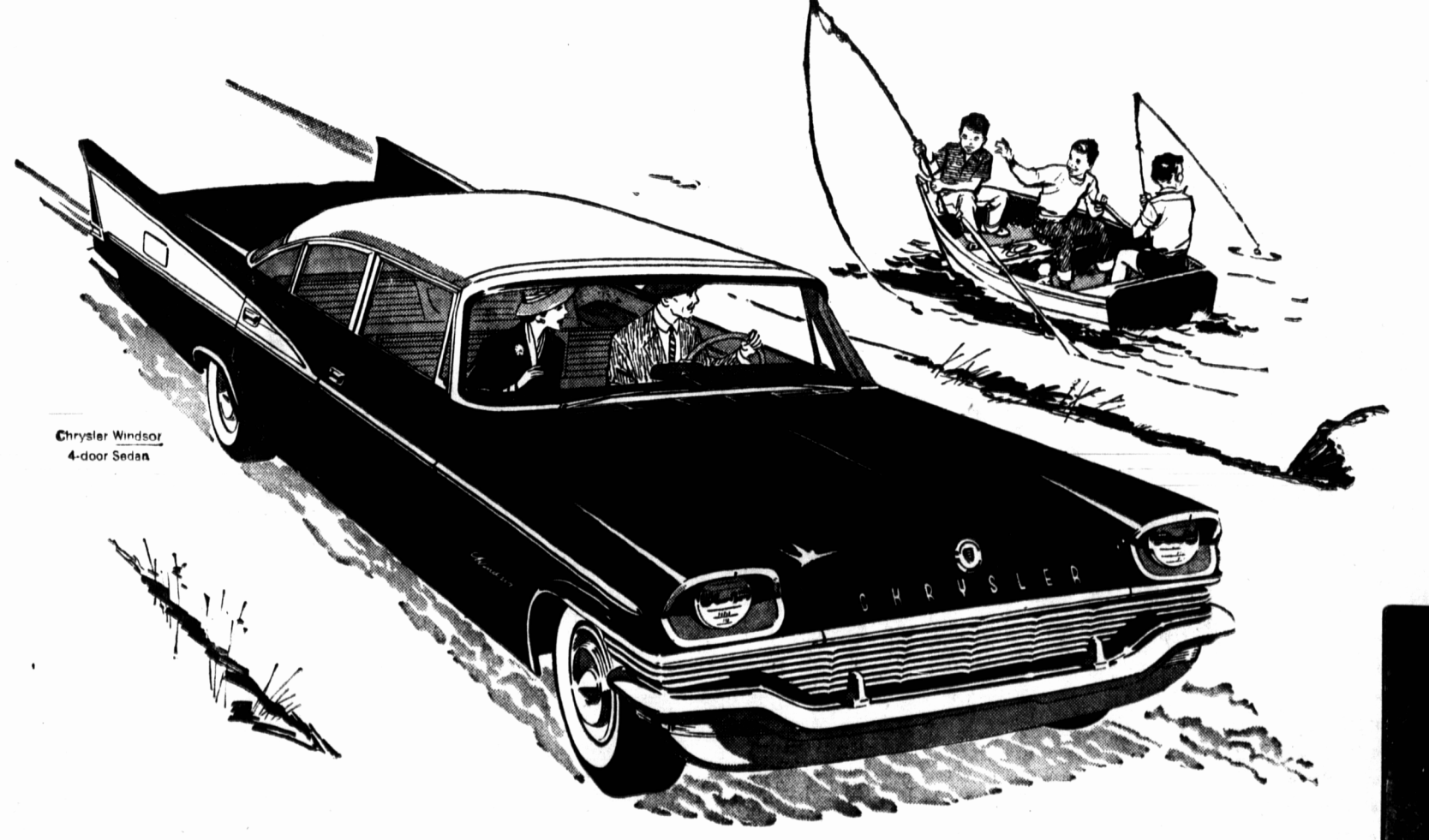

**SPEAKERS GRADED**

Clubs meet once a week at breakfast, luncheon or dinner. Each member speaks at least once. To permit this, club membership has been held to 30 although, because of demand, a coming by-law revision will permit 40.  
Each speech is criticized orally and in writing by a fellow toastmaster.
