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# For PPs Lift Blockade Supply Measures

## Job Days 30,640 In Prince

 OTTAWA — Prince County is again taking full advantage of the winter works program, Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught said here Wednesday.

The latest list of projects involves 18,500 days work for Prince County workers and this is an addition to 12,010 days work for projects previously announced, making a total so far of 30,640 days work.

The new projects include a brushing and clearing job in the Egmont Bay area which will provide 2,000 days work and another 1,920 days work for Alberton workmen is made possible through work on the interior of the arena.

The federal government will contribute \$60,000 to build homes for the aged at Summerside with 3,600 days work and another 2,000 days is provided in the construction of housing units or senior citizens.

Other Summerside projects are construction of a garbage warehouse, municipal race track stadium, installation of fence on low property, deep well pump, roofing the town of ice and installation of storm sewers.

Mr. MacNaught also announced that Craupaid is to have a new curbing rink which will be built under the winter weeks and will provide 700 days work for workmen in that area.

## Passage Ends 8 Day Debate

OTTAWA (CP)—The Conservatives lifted their blockade of the government's interim supply bill Wednesday and nine days after the debate started, the Commons approved spending of \$740,000,000 for November and December.

If the measure had not been approved within a week or so the government would have had no money to pay its bills, including the salaries of civil servants and the disbursements of Parliament and a subsequent election would likely have resulted.

After an eight-day debate, largely dominated by Conservative speakers and continuing criticism of constitutional matters and the C.B.C. tax bill was approved with little debate.

Then the House moved on to the consideration of departmental spending estimates which will continue for the rest of the week.

## Drury Reply Is Clarified

OTTAWA (CP)—Industry Minister Drury Wednesday clarified an answer he gave in the Commons Tuesday. He said his department has not yet been able to find alternative projects for the ex-ante and besting projects plant at Charlottetown.

## Rebellion Rumbles Heard In Ranks Of Republicans

 WASHINGTON (CP)—Senator Barry Goldwater officially accepted President Lyndon B. Johnson's crushing election victory Wednesday and indicated that "as of now" he has no intention of running for reelection in 1968.

But the Arizona man plans to stick firmly at the helm of the Republican party, working to rebuild it. He spoke his first rumblings of rebellion came from party moderates.

"I don't feel that the Conservative cause has been hurt," said Goldwater, leader of the right-wing Republicans who captured the party with his presidential nomination last July.

"Twenty-five million votes is a lot of votes."

At a noon press conference near his hilltop home in Phoenix, Goldwater acknowledged defeat, congratulated Johnson for his victory, and said he would accept a job and read a telegram he had sent the victor.

## Liberal MPs Prodding At PCs Sensitive Spot

OTTAWA (CP)—Liberals prodded away Wednesday at a sensitive spot on the Progressive Conservative anatomy—justice minister's former Justice Minister Fulton about a proposed formula for amending the Constitution.

Twice in the Commons Liberal M.P. Maurice Moreau (York-Scarborough) and Marcel Prud'homme (Montreal St. Denis) drew attention to the issue being made of a memo by Mr. Fulton on the Liberal government's proposed amending formula.

The memo backs parts of the government's proposed formula as identical to the one Mr. Fulton proposed as Conservative justice minister in 1961. At other places, it questions whether too much limitation is being placed on the amending formula through new parts added to the 1961 provisions.

Part of the question in the Commons last Friday by Edon Williams (P.C.—Bow River) was whether the amending formula in the proposed Tuesday in press reports suggesting Mr. Fulton's views can be regarded as a concession by Opposition Leader Diefenbaker.

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## U.S. Election Results Given in Digest Form

**WASHINGTON (AP)—** In digest, here are the results of November's U.S. general elections.

**House**  
 Democrats widened their margin of control far beyond the 257 to 178, including vacancies, of the present Congress. They won 291 seats and were leading in five other districts. Republicans captured 138 seats and led in one other.

**Governors**  
 Republicans made a net gain of one, but the Democrats still hold a big lead in the state houses—33 to 17. Of the 25 seats at stake Tuesday, Democrats took 16 and Republicans 9. Democrats turned Republicans out in Utah and Arizona, but were themselves ousted from control in Massachusetts, Washington and Wisconsin.

## Senator Young Defeats Taft

**COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—** Senator Stephen M. Young, 47-year-old Democratic incumbent, won a narrow victory for re-election in Ohio over Republican Representative Robert Taft Jr., on the basis of complete, unofficial returns.
