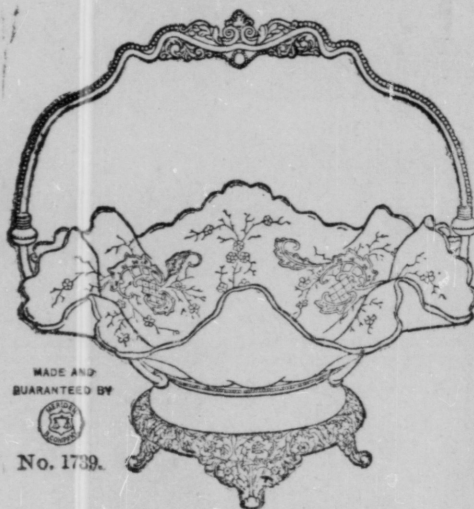

—The market today was not largely attended. There was no material change in prices.

—The Liberal-Conservative Committee Room in the Brown Block, in the office lately occupied by Mr. E. R. Brow, are now open every day and evening. Canvassers and friends of the party are expected to report there every night.

—The headquarters of the Liberal-Conservative organization for the Georgetown district will be held in the Liberal-Conservative Committee Rooms, Kehoe's building, Main Street. All communications should be addressed to N. Fairchild, Secretary.

—In St. Peter's schoolroom on Tuesday next, Nov. 27th, at 8 p. m. Lieut. Arthur Mellish will give what must be a most interesting lecture on some details of the many and varied experiences of our good soldiers during the war in South Africa. Admission 15c. Doors open at 7.30.

—The Northumberland did not cross to Summerside last night on account of the C.P.R. being three hours behind time, and there was no foreign mail. The steamer crossed early this morning, however, in time to connect with the early train for Charlottetown, which brought the mail to the city.

—A special meeting of Presbytery was held this morning in Zion Church to consider the formation of a Presbyterian Sunday School Association. The necessity of such an association was admitted and the recommendations of the convenor of committee on the matter were adopted. A number of resolutions were passed to forward the movement.

—The attention of all lecture going people is called to one which will surely be of interest given by Lieut. Arthur Mellish, in St. Peter's Schoolroom, on Tuesday evening next, Nov. 27th, at 8 o'clock. Mr. Mellish graphically describes incidents of the various campaigns "Our Boys" were engaged in during their good service in South Africa. The boys in khaki will cheer by some good choruses.

—Early this morning a young man named Wesley Snow, son of Capt. Snow, met with a very severe accident at the corner of Euston and School Streets. A live electric wire, belonging to the Royal Electric Co., was lying on the sidewalk, and on this he stepped and was immediately drawn toward the ground. He struggled to clear himself and in his endeavors to do so reached the middle of the street where the wire, which had burnt him badly on the neck and also on the hands, became loosened, and he disentangled himself from it. The result of such accidents is, in the majority of cases, something more serious than the most severe bodily injuries that can be received, and Mr. Snow has to be thankful that his case has gone no farther than burns.
