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Strange But True

Some 1.5 million tourists visited Switzerland this past summer. One might call it the land of peace and prosperity. The people of Switzerland enjoy the highest standard of living in Europe, although they number only 4.8 million (about half the population of London). The little kingdom is almost entirely without natural resources. Barely 6 per cent is arable.

Yet Switzerland's per capita gold holdings top all other countries at \$308 (the U. S. \$138). Its unemployment rate is the lowest in all the world.

The result of this amazing prosperity might be summed up in just two words: peace and precision. The watch industry is a fine example of the latter. The Swedish steel imported for hairspings cost \$5 a pound. The finished product is worth \$50.00 a pound.

The increased value is added by Swiss skill and precision. Building one watch requires more than 2,000 separate operations. Some of the screws used are so tiny it would take 50,000 of them to fill a ladies thimble.

The Swiss watch industry has about 2,000 manufacturers, employing 50,000 workers. In 1953 they exported somewhere between 33 and 34 million watches and watch movements worth 258 million dollars.

What's the matter with Prince Edward Island becoming the manufacturer of some exclusive product? We would not have to worry about being isolated then, or far away from the big markets. If we had something the rest of the world wanted we would not have to worry about distance or tariffs or anything else.

When the U. S. reciprocal Trade Agreement of 1936 under which the American tariff on watch movements from Switzerland was cut from 82.6 to 37 per cent since 1950 you will get a better picture of what I am trying to point out. In Berkeley, California, Life Insurance agent Howard Martin was making little headway in selling Paul McCracken on the importance of a policy. While they were discussing the issue, a bullet shattered the window, raced madly around the room and fell at the prospect's feet. It had been fired by a neighbor in a bungling attempt at suicide. McCracken needed.
