Special East-West Trip Starting Over The CNR

MONCTON—Everything is just about lined up for the "Overlander" and "Bluenose" special trains that will take vacationing Canadians from cities and towns in the Maritimes and the West on cross-country junkets to visit their homes or just a holiday, this summer, the Canadian National Railway announces.

The "Overlander" party will leave Newfoundland on July 4th, Sydney, New Glasgow, Halifax, Truro, Charlottetown and Saint John on the 6th, and Moncton on the morning of the 7th. Arrival in Edmonton will be on July 12th and the return trip starts on August 3rd, arriving back at Atlantic Provinces points on August 7th to 9th.

The "Bluenose Special" group leaves Edmonton to come east on July 14th, and will arrive in Moncton, Saint John, Charlottetown, Truro, Halifax and New Glasgow on the 19th, with final completion of the tour at Sydney on the 20th, and St. John's, Nfld., on the 22nd. Known as the "house party on wheels", the trips by the specials have become very popular during the last several years. The "Overlander" will be making its fifth annual trip and the "Bluenose" its eighth this year.

The trains consist of air-conditioned sleepings cars and a diner,

and there is a car especially fitted up for entertainment purposes. During the trip movies are shown, and sing-songs and other forms of recreation are conducted. There is a playground designed to keep the children happy and occupied during the train ride.

J.V. Dodds of Edmonton, who is responsible for the arrangement of the tours, will accompany the trains to ensure that everything goes smoothly, and representatives of the CNR traffic department also will be on hand during the trips.

Lobster Cases Heard At Souris Court

Before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at Souris Wednesday, a resident of Cable Head charged with possession of under sized lobsters was fined \$17 and costs or ten days. Three other Fisheries cases were adjourned until July 11th.

A resident of Little Pond, charged under the Motor Vehicle Act, for driving a vehicle with defective equipment was fined \$5 and Bristol, for operating a motor vehicle without an operator's permit received a fine of \$5 and costs or five days, while a resident of Rollo Bay was fined \$5 and costs or five days for failing to stop at a stop sign.

Under the Temperance Act a resident of Selkirk and one of Anandale were fined \$20 and costs or 30 days for possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residence. For intoxication in a public place two residents of Charlottetown, another from East Point, and a third from Little Harbour, were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days. For possession of liquor not purchased at the Retail Vendors, (moonshine) a resident of Little Sands and a resident of Souris were each fined \$25 and costs or 30 days.

Also on the docket was a case under the Excise Act which was mandated for one week, and in case under the Criminal Code, in accused, a resident of Souris, pleaded guilty and was remanded for a week for sentence.
