ANOTHER SHIPMENT.—The Agriculturalist says:—Messrs. Avar and Drummond shipped by the Princess on Saturday morning, for Mr. John McDonald, St. John, twenty-two head of cattle and a quantity of lambs. The cattle were a very good lot, and among them were three two-year-old steers fed by Mr. James Enman, Crapaud, which were especially fine, weighing about 1,200 lbs each.
