At a public meeting held in the new Presbyterian Church, at Orwell Head, on Thursday, the 14th day of March inst. at 6 o'clock, afternoon, in answer to a previous call, and which was constituted by inviting E. Lamont, Esq., to the chair, and appointing the undersigned, Secretary the following resolutions were submitted and unanimously carried:-

1st. Resolved, That a suitable monument be erected to the memory of the late Rev. Donald McDonald, Minister of the Church of Scotland, as a token of sincere respect for departed worth, and due appreciation of his long and faithful services in the ministry of the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

2d. Resolved, That in order to provide for the requisite outlay, a Secretary and Treasurer be forthwith appointed, for the congregation at Orwell Head, who shall be prepared on and after the 18th day of March instant, to receive contributions and keep a correct list of contributors' names together with the sums respectively deposited; and that Mr. W. MacPhail, be respectfully requested to accept of that appointment.

3d. Resolved, That as this meeting is aware that several others, who have not been under the pastoral care of the late Rev. Donald McDonald, including personal friends and some of his brethren in the ministry, are anxious to contribute their mite of respect to this memory—contributions from such will be thankfully received and duly acknowledged.

4th. Resolved, That in order to engage the simultaneous co-operation as far as may be practicable, of all the other congregations that have been under his ministerial charge, the minutes of this meeting be published in all the Island papers.

According to announcement, a numerously attended meeting of District Teachers was held yesterday in the Normal School rooms. The various defects in the present Education Act and the amendments required to render it just to the teacher and satisfactory to the country, were ably pointed out. The principal questions of discussion were the uses and advantages of the Normal School in our educational machinery, the necessity of a more efficient system of school visiting, and the increase of Teachers' salaries, with a graduation in the scale of payment according to length of service. After these subjects had been fully considered, a committee was appointed to prepare a draft petition to be presented to the Legislature, setting forth the teachers' grievances and suggesting the alterations they wished to be made in the laws relating to education. As the proceedings of the meeting were ordered to be published in all the papers, we expect to be able to give the Secretary's report in Thursday's issue.—Pat.

London, 17th. Reform Bill will be brought into Parliament to-morrow. It gives right of suffrage to men paying one pound yearly tax, or having thirty pounds in savings bank, or fifty pounds fund, and to all members of learned profession, fifteen pounds.—Franchise Counties. Gold 34.

London, March 20. Fenian Leader and forty others have been taken at Clonmel, Ireland, in irons. Head Centre Donovan caught at Cork. Iron clad ship sent to Liverpool from Woolwich.

San Francisco, March 18. Legislative Council of British Columbia voted unanimously for admission into Colonial Confederation.

Montreal March 20. Capt. Doherty and three hundred seamen ordered Westward from Montreal to man gunboats.

Charlottetown, March 21, 1867. Several Government appointments made. Officers of Conservative party, still holding on with undying tenacity. Excitement among parties on both sides still continue. Silas Barnard, Esquire, appointed Superintendent Public Works. No other appointments worth naming. No change in Post Office, Registry Office, Road Correspondent, Deputy Colonial Secretary, Normal School, Visitorship, &c.

Retention of above, highly unpopular in Liberal ranks, and reported dangerous, if not fatal, to re-election of leader. Money market still tight. Trade very dull. Banks discounting very limited. Weather fine all appearance of early spring.

Latest from Europe.

Dublin, March 9. Despatches received during the day from Dublin and Cork give the following particulars of the last outbreak in Ireland.—The fight took place on Tuesday night at Talaght, about eight miles from Dublin, between the armed police and a large body of Fenians, one of the latter was killed, and five wounded. The police captured 80 persons, and 6 loads of ammunition. Up to dark to-day over 200 persons had been brought up to Dublin. The main body of the Fenians engaged in the fight retreated to the hills north of Dublin, with Lord Stranbhola, the Commander of the British forces in Ireland, in vigorous pursuit.

The police station at Balmallock, 13 miles south of Limerick, in the county of Munster, was attacked by 200 Fenians, who were refused, leaving 39 of their number lying dead upon the ground, and losing 15 prisoners. The barracks of the police at Dromore, county Down, in the north, had been founded by an incendiary, and totally destroyed. Reports from Dublin state that the various bands of Fenians appear to be well supplied with weapons, and they seem to have raised about eighty all parts of the Island. They attacked the Coast Guard, stationed at Killeigh, in the County Clare, and took away their arms.

Dublin, March 9. A despatch from Waterford states that the Gally Mountains, on the borders of Tipperary and Cork Counties, are swarming with Fenians, and it is feared an attack will be made upon the town of Tipperary, the inhabitants of which are disaffected, and strangely disposed to help them.

London, March 9. Official despatches from Ireland say that loads of arms have been discovered and seized by the military, and this fact seems to confirm the reports that the rising of the Irish failed to be general.

London, March 9. Despatches from Dublin state that small bands of Fenians are patrolling the counties of Cork, Waterford, Tipperary, and Limerick, pressing the people into their ranks, and committing robberies elsewhere. The taverns in the city of Cork are to be closed every evening at dusk.

We understand that the Writs for the partial Elections were issued on Wednesday last. It is reported that the Hon. George Coles is going to have opposition this time; for the truth of this, however, we cannot vouch. Hons. Messrs. Coles, Hensley, and Whelan, are the three members who go back to their constituents. There will also be an election to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Mr. Clark.
