WAR NEWS.

[By Telegraph to Reading Room and Daily Examiner.]

LONDON, Feb. 20.

The channel squadron to-day proceeded eastward from Gibraltar.

Vienna despatches say that Bismarck's speech caused general satisfaction in political and diplomatic circles.

It is believed that Germany has no intention of attempting to counteract or of deciding the measures which Austria may adopt to uphold her interests.

Belgrade despatches say that General Lisgau has gone to Adrianople to endeavor to obtain some modification of peace preliminaries in favor of Serbia, and to protest against the occupation of Nisch by the Russians.

The Servians are already removing their artillery from Nisch in order to secure its safety.

Bucharest advices say that at the sitting of the Senate on Wednesday, the Minister of Foreign Affairs said that the Roumanian railways were practically in the hands of the Russians, and that he would insist on the rights of Roumania being recognized, but that efforts to remedy this disgraceful state of affairs had so far been unavailing; he further stated that Russia was negotiating without the consent or authority of the Government, questions which concerned Roumania alone.

The Standard's special from Negotin says that the Turkish commander at Widdin and Belgrade refused to surrender or to recognize Roumania, although the Russians insist upon them doing so.

Advices from Rome say that Cardinal Pecci was chosen Pope at the third ballot. The moderate party hesitated between Cardinals Franchi and Pecci, but the conflicting elements have been harmonized.

OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 21.

Perry moved for order of the House for accounts and vouchers showing the amount of expenses incurred in running the Northern Light, also the cost of her repairs last summer. He said he did not think he could attach great blame to the Government, but a mistake was made. The only possible route was between the Capes, and the Government should concentrate its efforts to keep constant winter communication there. As the Island had no representative in the Cabinet, it was necessary to keep matters before the House.

Smith recounted his experience crossing, and agreed with Perry. Tupper said the mails should always be sent by the Capes until, by experiment with the Northern Light, the very best route for her had been ascertained.

McIntyre contended that Cape George was a proper place for the steamer to run—to send her to Cape Traverse would cost too much.

Pope asked Perry to add to his motion by requesting report of Engineer as to the condition of the Northern Light before and after being on Pictou Slip. He denounced the steamer as a fraud; blamed the Island representatives for accepting her, and blamed the Government for persisting in keeping her on Georgetown route after the representations made to the Premier by the majority of the Island representatives last year. He said bungling and stoppage of mails was a great loss to the mercantile community.

Smith admitted that the Capes was the proper place for the Northern Light to run. Pope asked, Then why do you keep her running on between Georgetown and Pictou? Motion passed.

LONDON, Feb. 18.

The "Morning Post's" Berlin despatch says: "It is doubtful if Prince Bismarck will make a full exposition of his Eastern policy, as was expected, in reply to the interpellation in Reichstag, on Tuesday. He will probably be more inclined to explain his views confidentially at one of his Parliamentary soirées."

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 18.

Two Russian officers have just arrived here, en route to Asia to fix the line of demarcation.

HALIFAX, Feb. 18.

About 7 this evening, a fire broke out in the post office, situated in Mr. J. E. Leadley's grocery store, in Dartmouth. The fire gutted the house, not, however, before the mail matter and appurtenances, shop-furniture and furniture of the house above had been nearly all removed. The office of the Dominion Telegraph Company was also in the same building, and was, along with the rest, pretty badly scorched.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

This Government has not received an invitation to send a representative to the Congress at Baden-Baden to deliberate upon the Eastern question. The propriety of accepting such an invitation when received, will be the subject of Cabinet discussion and be treated with all the importance it deserves.

The French Minister here officially states that all reports from Paris as to the Exposition are most favorable and indicate that there will be nothing to prevent its opening on 1st of May.

LONGEVITY.—Mrs. Catherine Jarvis, whose years were five score and ten, died on the 6th inst., at the residence of her son Joseph, at Weymouth Falls, Digby. She was born a slave, but came to Nova Scotia in 1782 with her loyalist master.—St. John Telegraph.

Germany's Attitude on the Eastern Question.

There is great disappointment in Russia at the attitude which Germany is now taking in regard to the Eastern Question, an attitude directly hostile to the aspirations of the Czar. The Russians, for some reason, brought themselves to believe that Germany was with them; that the alliance of the three Emperors was a bond strong enough to bear any strain, and that William would never interfere with Alexander no matter how much Turkish territory he wished to gobble up. Now the Russians have learned, to their great disgust, that Germany thinks that the line must be drawn somewhere, and that Russia has already more than crossed the permissible line in the way of territorial expansion. The prompt manner in which the Czar has retreated from his former attitude since he learned that he could not rely on German aid shows now arant a coward this great bully is. He is willing now to evacuate Roumelia; he is willing to make pledges that his troops will retire from Turkish territory at the end of two years; he will give pledges not to go near Gallipoli. He has grown wonderfully modest and moderate now that he finds himself face to face with England, and without any other allies but a few Yankee editors, whose hatred of everything British makes them purblind. The Russians, therefore, will gracefully retire from Roumelia, and the editors in question will tear their long hair with rage thereat.—St. John Telegraph.

In Montreal there are about 17,994 municipal voters disqualified from non-payment of taxes.

The County Court of this County met in the Grand Jury Room of the New Court House at noon to-day. There are a large number of cases to be tried.

A FIGHT between the Young Britons and the Sons of Ireland is an every day occurrence in Montreal. Montreal is, indeed, fast becoming the Belfast of Canada.

A DESPATCH from Montreal, dated the 18th inst., says: There have been three violent deaths from drink within twenty-four hours.

We regret to learn that the Rev. D. F. McDonald, P. P. of Tignish, is seriously indisposed. His Lordship Bishop McIntyre was telegraphed for on Wednesday, and he left for Tignish to-day.

The case of the Queen vs. Thomas McCloskey, for riot, is still before the Supreme Court. There were nineteen witnesses examined for the defense. As we go to press, Mr. Hodgson commenced addressing the Jury for the traverser.

THERE was but one trial before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning, Michael Cullen, drunk and incapable, was fined \$2.25, paid. Martin Carroll's assault case was again postponed till Monday.

UNDER the heading, "A Dead Infant Found," the Acadian Recorder says: "About seven o'clock on the evening of the 17th, the body of an infant, apparently about two weeks old, was found by Mr. McCullough at his door step; the child was lightly clothed and was found in a half-bushel basket. It was crying when found. Mr. McCullough took it into his house and informed the police, but they were unwilling to remove it. It is still at Mr. McCullough's house."

THE Court Journal believes the Marquis of Lorne is to be Lord Dufferin's successor, and adds: "The obvious reason for extending Lord Dufferin's term by a few months is that after the present session the Parliamentary term lapses, and the assembly of a new House of Commons, with the possibility of a political crisis, had best be held before the arrival of a new Governor General." As Lord Dufferin leaves here in September, the elections must come on before then, and as it is unusual to bring them on in the harvest time, Mr. McKenzie will probably go to the country in June. Let our friends gird up their loins without delay.—Toronto Mail.

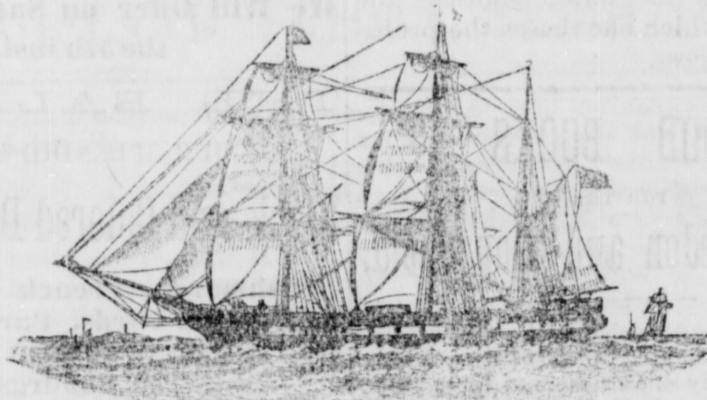
