

Western World Changes Pose Business Problem

The big change in business last week for many weeks before and for a long time to come, is the new nature of the Western world — economically and probably politically.

Signposts to this are the words of President Kennedy who, in a July 4 speech at Philadelphia, declared: "I will say, here and now, on this day of independence, that the United States will stand for a declaration of interdependence, that the United States will be prepared to discuss with a united Europe the ways and means of forming a concrete Atlantic partnership — a mutually beneficial partnership between the new union emerging in Europe and the old American union founded here a century and three-quarters ago."

To which a spokesman for the European Common Market executive commission in Brussels replied: "President Kennedy's words are a challenge to accept the great opportunities of our age — to move forward swiftly and directly to the achievement of a full European unification and thus to lay the foundation of an Atlantic partnership, a partnership which takes into account a responsibility to the entire free world."

MEANINGFUL TODAY
A few years ago these words could have been approved with their idealism but dismissed as relative only to a distant millennium. Today, however, the practical trends to follow much more closely on the heels of the ideas that we must accept.

It follows in a practical manner, with hard reasoning, hard bargaining and a hard eye on present realities. There appears to be this difference, however: In the past the immediate practical considerations dictated the end; today the practical steps — with some concern to human dignity — are being made to conform to the ideal's end.

Perhaps the key is that the

ideal has become the practical. President Kennedy's words are a historic note in the House of Representatives which, on administration's Trade Expansion Act, giving the president authority to negotiate low tariffs with Europe.

The legislation still has to pass the Senate, but the House vote was one that only the most optimistic would have forecast a few months ago. It is indicative of the pace of events.

Adjusting to the new trading and political world ahead appears to be the key problem of Canada and Canadian business men in the years ahead.

MUST SELL MORE
Business men must cope both with selling today's nuts and bolts and with being in a position to sell them in 1970. Nationally, the problems are broader, but the success of either the businessman or the national government will depend upon how well each does his job.

Canada has to think of the future while for the moment trying to solve pressing immediate problems that have brought us to something of an austere program.

The program is a holding action until more basic matters are solved and so far appears to be having some success, though many of its ultimate results remain unknown.

The Canadian dollar apparently has steadied in its foreign exchange value around its peg of 92 cents (U.S.) and our foreign exchange reserves have made a start on recovering some of their heavy losses.

A full-and-balanced action goes on in money markets under the supervisory and watchful eye of the monetary authorities. Money is higher-priced for borrowers, more rewarding for savers, and modest, and presumably there is a desire for the price to be high enough to counterbalance with some measure of stability, but not high enough to brake legitimate expansion.

Economic activity in Canada

and the United States continues at a high level, though with less steam than had been hoped for 1962. The key immediate question is whether or not the present advance will continue, even if moderately, or whether a new recession may be ahead.

Preparations Proceed For Ecumenical Council

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Pope has approved a scouting a scouring as never before.

The sprinter—the Vatican's nimble, wall-scaling workers—are visible everywhere cleaning and polishing.

All the renovating is in anticipation of the ecumenical council of the Roman Catholic Church, the first full council since the council of the Roman Catholic hierarchy before the throne of Pope John.

There is much hope that Christian unity lies beyond the doors where 3,000 prelates and theologians gather Oct. 11 for possibly six months of discussions and decisions.

Ecumenism — the movement in Christian churches toward rapport and eventual union — is bound to the aims of the council but is not the council's chief reason for existence.

The gathering to be known as the Second Vatican Council — will be a council of discipline for the internal church.

MAKES UP HIS MIND
Pope John has set as an immediate goal an internal renewal of Catholicism and a spiritual revitalization of its approximately 500,000,000 members.

Three years ago, in his first encyclical letter, the Pope linked the council with aspirations for unity in this way: "For those who are separated from the Apostolic See, it (the council) is a sweet invitation to seek and to find unity."

He emphasized in later statements that the unity he has in mind is not a confederation of Roman Catholic, Protestant and orthodox churches but a return of Protestants and the orthodox to Rome.

More energy and thoroughness have gone into preparations for the second Vatican council than any of the 20 previous councils.

The 10 commissions and two secretariats appointed by the Pope aligned topics into 70 "sessions" or texts. It is these that the council fathers will

discuss, debate and finally accept or reject in amended or original versions.

There has been no public mention of sensational subjects, but there is sure to be lively debate on topics such as: proposed conciliar reforms that would fix the date for Easter as an annual constant instead of the first Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal (spring) equinox.

The decrees issued by the council, which will be binding on all Roman Catholics.
