Frank Currie To Coach Stampede

CALGARY, (CP)—Frank Currie, who guided Edmonton Flyers to the Allan Cup championship in 1948, is the new coach and manager of the Calgary Stampede of the Western Hockey League, it was announced Friday.

Currie was a prime mover in organizing the present Western Hockey League prior to the 1952 season. Last year he acted as scout and trouble shooter for Montreal Canadiens of the National Hockey League.

A former defenceman with Montreal Royals of the Quebec Senior League, Currie led Edmonton Flyers of the Western Canada Senior League to Edmonton's only Allan Cup triumph in 1947-48 against Ottawa Senators in his senior coaching debut.

Predicts K. O. In Fifth

In a telephone conversation with promoter Ivan Doherty yesterday, Gil Edwards, sensational young kayo artist and former golden gloves champ of New York says, "Poulton wouldn't be around to answer the bell for the sixth round."

Bobby Gleason, manager of Edwards, says: "I heard quite a bit about both Poulton and Yvon Durelle, and I figure Gil can take either Canadian fighter. Gil Edwards is strictly a fighter, strong and willing to mix it."

Durable and aggressive, he is a swashbuckling battler, anxious to trade wallops with rugged, two-trade chin blasters. Gil leaves scientific boxing for fancy dance like Poulton; to waste in and toss punches in his stock and trade.

When P. E. I. fight fans get an eyeful of this middleweight in action," declares Gleason, "they'll be pleasantly surprised, and Poulton will wish Edwards had remained in New York."

Checking Nat Fleischer's Ring Record Book, Edwards is 21 years old, turned pro in 1951 with a 3 round kayo over Charley Matthews on Dec. 19th. Since that first pro fight, Edwards has had 14 more fights, winning 7 by kayos. Gil has kayoed the last 14 men he faced—can he make Poulton No. 6?

Some of Edwards' opponents have fought the best in the world, particularly clever Willie Dockery, who won a very close decision to Ralph "Tiger" Jones (who pulled the biggest upset in boxing last year when he beat Johnny Bratton).

In Edwards' last fight, a main bout in New York, Johnny Noel (conqueror of Jimmie Herring) was out-boxing Edwards easily, until Gil caught up to him and stopped him in the sixth round.

This will be Edwards' first Canadian appearance. Edwards has had 15 pro fights; 67 amateur fights, winning 62 of his fights.
