Amherst Time, on the 21st day of July, 1950, for the construction of the Johnston River, Queens Co. Prince Edward Island.

Contract number and approximate extent of work: — P.E.I. 1-50, 6000 cu. yds. borrow, 7000 tons of rock, 70 cu. yds. reinforced concrete and other works.

Plans, specifications and forms of tender may be obtained at the address shown below or at the Province of Prince Edward Island Department of Public Works Office, Charlottetown, P.E.I. A deposit of twenty dollars (\$20.00) by cash or by cheque made payable to the Receiver General of Canada, will be required for each set of plans, specifications and documents. This deposit may be recovered upon the return of the plans, specifications and documents in good condition within thirty days (30 days) of July 21st, 1950, to the address shown below.

Each Tender must be accompanied by a certified cheque on a Canadian chartered bank, payable to the order of the Receiver General of Canada, in the sum of ten per cent (10%) of the estimated cost of the work.
