Mount Stewart had 78 donors at yesterday afternoon's Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic, and Morell had 113 last night. This was 84 short of the day's objective of 275. The 23 deficit from Monday's Clinics made a total shortage of 107 for the first two days of Clinics. 657 donors will be required in the next two days in order that the province may reach its quota for this week's series. Today's Clinics are at Cardigan this afternoon, and at Souris this evening, and tomorrow's at Eldon and Montague.

Colorful R. A. F.
Mascot Dies

LONDON (AP)—Fit. Sgt. Lewis, a tobacco-loving hard-drinking billy goat, was buried with full military honors Tuesday.

As mascot for the RAF, the year-old goat led a colorful though at times rowdy life. With a special jacket and sparkling chevrons, he marched at the head of many a notable London parade.

Fit. Sgt. Lewis, as he was officially registered on the rolls of the RAF, retired in 1948.

At his passing out parade, attended by high-ranking officers and airmen, he was presented with demobilization papers, a ration book and an embossed pension certificate.

He promptly ate all the documents. At a reception in the parlor of the Lord Mayor of Eastbourne, the goat once snatched a cigarette from his worshiper's fingers and downed it before his keepers could shout halt.

LOVED TOBACCO, BEER
Before the reception was over he swallowed five more cigarettes. From that time on, cigarettes and beer became a part of his diet.

The goat, still looked after by the RAF, had been living in retirement on a pleasant meadow near a London suburb. Last year he slowed down with arthritis.

Doctors put him on a special diet and denied him the cigarettes and suds. The goat got worse. In desperation his keepers returned him to his tobacco and beer. He brightened. But old age caught up with him last week. Quietly, he was put away.

Inquest Begins
In Gaspe Crash

STE. ANNE-DES-MONTS, Que. (CP)—A coroner's inquest into the death of two Americans in a plane crash near this Gaspe community last Monday was opened Monday for identification purposes and adjourned pending completion of investigation into the cause of the mishap.

The victims were pilot John Robert Kovel, 28, of Buffalo, N.Y. and co-pilot Peter J. Lorenz, 40, of Lincoln, Neb.

They were bound for Goose Bay, Labrador, from New York City when their twin-engine Aero Commander crashed near the peak of 2,500-foot Mount Schic-Schoc, 10 miles from this south shore St. Lawrence River town.

The plane was last heard from March 6 going into a snowstorm. The wreckage and the bodies were found Aug. 19 by residents of St. Octave-de-l'Avenir, Que., a community near the mountain.

The coroner, Dr. Delphis Niville, said the remains of the victims have been taken to Montreal for cremation prior to being shipped to the respective families.

Federal transport department investigators are still on the scene trying to determine cause of the crash.

Wisconsin
Elects Democrat

MILWAUKEE (AP)—William E. Proxmire Tuesday night became the first Democrat the state has elected to the U.S. Senate since 1932.

Proxmire, 41, scored an upset victory over Republican Walter J. Kohler Jr., 53, three times governor of Wisconsin, in the state's special election to name a successor to the late Senator Joseph R. McCarthy.

Returns from 3,096 of the state's 3,361 precincts gave Proxmire 374,825, Kohler 276,917.

Murder Trial
Is Postponed

DALHOUSIE, N.B. (CP)—The second trial for murder of Joseph Pierre Richard was postponed Tuesday to Sept. 24. He appeared in the Restigouche circuit court before Mr. Justice W. Arthur I. Anglin.

Crown prosecutor Albany Robichaud of Bathurst requested the adjournment on grounds a key crown witness, RCMP Sgt. Ralph Bryenton, is ill and will not be able to testify until about four more weeks.

An appeal to the New Brunswick Supreme Court resulted in the granting of a new trial for Richard on grounds that state agents he allegedly made to police before the laying of a charge were improperly admitted into evidence at the trial. He was convicted of murdering Mary Catherine D. LaPerrelle, 13, at Charlottetown Feb. 9.

Housing Loan
Details Friday

OTTAWA (CP)—Details of the government's plan to make \$150,000,000 available for loans for financing construction of low-priced homes are expected to be announced by Friday, it was learned Tuesday.

An official of Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation said a definition of a low-priced home likely will be announced at that time. The definition may involve varying price ceilings in different parts of the country.

Officials of the crown agency met Tuesday with representatives of the Canadian Bankers Association to discuss agreements under which lending institutions will operate as agents for CMHC. The lending organizations will make loans available to home-owner applicants, builders and rental investors.

CMHC officials will meet today with representatives of life insurance and trust and loan companies.
