

Ferguson Raps Gov't Over Increased Debt

Speaking in the budget debate in the Legislature yesterday, George Ferguson (L-5th Kings) said the 1953-54 budget indicates that we have a government of mismanagement, extravagance and wastefulness.

Mr. Ferguson said that "from the time of confederation until September 1959 the debt of the province became \$27,842,000 and in a little over four years, this debt has increased by over \$11,000,000."

At the same time, this government is securing increased revenues over the previous government. This government is receiving \$17,103,000 more than the previous government and as still coming up with a deficit of \$3,000,000. There is no doubt that the finances of the province are in a bad way.

Mr. Ferguson said the increase in debt charges from 1959 until the story "Debt charges in 1959," he said, "were \$1,724,000 and for the year ending March 31, 1964, they are estimated at \$1,445,000. Charges have increased by 100 per cent. That is the story that is all that tells to be said."

nothing was done on it. I think this minister should take over from the minister of agriculture when he resigns."

It was also suggested by Dr. Bonnell that Industry and Natural Resources Minister Leo Ressler resign.

"The P.E.I. Industrial Establishment Corporation was given \$3,000,000 before and the year before was given \$2,000,000. No report of the spending has been given to the Legislature. With no full report, that man should resign."

Referring to Premier Walter J. Shaw, Dr. Bonnell said "I would like to see him in this Legislature for the remainder of his years. He always adds good thoughts and good advice. I hope he will be here in the opposition after a few years."

Dr. Bonnell also called for the resignation of Welfare and Labor Minister Henry Wedge. Some of the Conservative private members should also resign, according to Dr. Bonnell. He said 2nd Queens member Lloyd MacPhail should resign after calling in Conservative members when a vote was to be taken on an amendment to the Liquor Control Act. Mr. MacPhail was chairman of the committee of the House when the liquor act bill came up for discussion. At one stage when the opposition moved that the bill be thrown out, it appeared that there were not enough Conservatives in the House to defeat the motion. Mr. MacPhail asked that the bell be rung to call absent Conservatives in for the vote. "There were others who spoke against liquor," said Dr. Bonnell, "but they voted in favor of it."

Among the things Dr. Bonnell said he would like to see in the province were: a vocational training school and modern hospital in Monague. Price Edward Island.

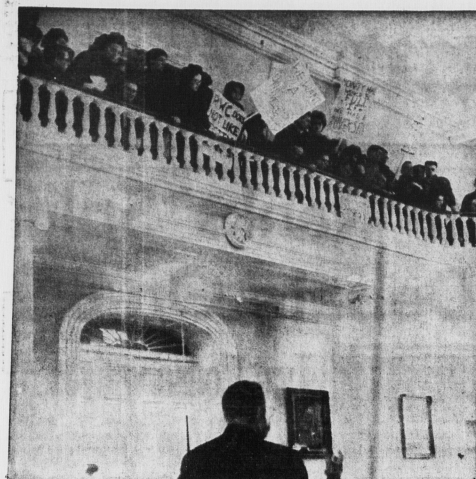
POSTPONED SPRAYER MEETINGS

All of these world-famed performers are Canadians.

The Sunday concerts will also include ensembles - Le Trio Baroque from Montreal (June 21); The Earle Terry Singers (June 28); the National Youth Orchestra, conducted by John Avison and Victoria Fellibelli (July 13).
