### Siamese Superstitions.

The first thing an orthodox Siamese does in the morning is to scare away the family ghosts who may have gathered about the old place in the night. Letting off crackers is an effectual means. ### Horse Racing and Socialism.

In the Militar Wochenblatt, a leading German military organ, Herr Von Ploetz recommends horse racing as a panacea for socialism. He says that the reason why there is no socialism in England is that they encourage horse racing there and that "the love of the sport is the connecting link between all classes of men, enabling the poor to comprehend the necessity for a difference of fortune."

Following out Herr Ploetz's idea, it is said that gambling on horse racing is increasing in Germany at a tremendous rate, though so far no diminution of socialism has been noticed.

An unknown layman has given \$100,000 toward the completion of the magnificent Roman Catholic Cathedral now in course of construction at Westminster. The identity of the giver will be revealed when a tablet commemorative of the founders is placed upon the interior walls.

### Local and Other Items.

SUPREME COURT.—The Supreme Court stands adjourned until the 6th of December.

SCOTT ACT.—Before Stipendiary Magistrate Blanchard, at Georgetown yesterday, John G Scrimgeour, of Cardigan, was fined in the sum of \$50 and costs for violating the Scott Act. A summons against Scrimgeour's son was dismissed because of some irregularity in the service.

ODDFELLOWS SOCIAL.—The Oddfellows social, in their lodge room last night, was attended by about sixty couples, and proved most enjoyable. The first part of the proceedings consisted of a musical and literary entertainment, at which Mr A Down presided, after which the guests indulged in games, etc. Refreshments were provided.

A. O. H.—The social under the auspices of Division No 1, last evening, was a most enjoyable affair, and ranks with the best ever given by the Order here. There were about sixty couples in attendance. The spacious reading and recreation room was thrown open to the guests, who were received by Mrs Blake, Mrs Byrne and Mrs Conroy. The well-appointed meeting room was used for reception and refreshment purposes.

THE PRINCESS.—The steamer Princess arrived from Pictou this morning about half past five o'clock, bringing 49 bags of mail matter and 15 passengers. The midnight train got to Pictou about 10 minutes after twelve, and the Princess left for Charlottetown about 1.10. The post office officials had the mails assorted in good season and letters and papers were sent East and West by the outgoing morning trains.

THE GLOUCESTER FLEET.—Fourteen vessels of the Gloucester fleet were lost during the last fishing year, and 82 men were drowned. There were several Islanders among those who were lost. The list includes: Captain Sigsworth, Lemuel Cantello and David Campbell, of the Schooner Annie and Mary; Captain Andrew McKenzie, Archibald McDonald, Charles Campbell, Michael Gallant, and Daniel Elsworth, of the schr. John E McKenzie; John A McDonald and Malcolm Matheson, of the schr. Hustler; Chas Mallett, of the schr. Mounachol. The financial loss of Gloucester vessel owners is over \$100,000.

FOOTBALL.—The McGill team defeated a team from Queen's University at Montreal on Saturday, the score standing 4 to 0. McGill scored a try four minutes after play began, and no more scoring was done during the game. The Queen's team put up a strong game, but they were able to overcome the McGill wing work, and to its wings McGill owes the victory. "Duffy" the Herald says, "was everywhere at once. If he could only dodge a little better he would be a world-beater. A run by him was one of the features of the game. Alley, besides playing a strong game, made an excellent captain." Sutherland, another Islander, who plays half-back for McGill, also put up a splendid game.

I. O. G. T.—Rev. W. J. Kirby, Lodge Deputy, assisted by Mr. W. G. Tabine and Miss M. Ross, installed the officers of Charlottetown Lodge, No. 68, last night. There were several visitors from Lodges on the Island and abroad, among whom was Bro. Williams, a past officer of the Grand Lodge of England, who has also held a high position in the Grand Lodge of India, has visited many countries of the world, where the order is established, and is at present a resident of Bermuda. In his address he described the general state of the order, particularly as it existed in the West Indies, where even on Her Majesty's ships there are lodges organized.

A talk on his trip to the Old Country will be delivered by Rev. W. J. Kirby next Thursday evening.

The class in book-keeping, under the auspices of the lodge, and conducted by Mr. E. H. Duchemin, is making satisfactory progress.
