

Wives O' Geoffrin Howe Exclude Hockey in Letters

"We write to each other two or three times a month but we seldom talk about hockey," said Mrs. Geoffrin, not only the wife of a hockey star but the daughter of one too.
Born Marlene MacKay Mor-

ens, she is the daughter of the late Howie Morens, a super wing before Boom was born.
Mrs. Geoffrin saw her father in action only on films, but those who saw him in person often ask her about him.
"When people talk to me about my husband," she said, "they talk about my father."
ALREADY TAKING LESSONS
With his strong penchant towards hockey in the family, there are possibilities that the Geoffrins' 13-year-old children, Linda, 9, Robert, 7, and Danny 4—may make their way with a head start in the skating world.
Linda is already taking lessons in figure skating, and Robert has begun to slap the puck around.
Mrs. Geoffrin herself gained a certain amount of fame as a Canadian junior figure skating champion.

How did the Geoffrins' first meet? Why, during an ice-skating carnival, of course.
They met when Marlene was a guest at a school festival in Montreal and Bernie was making an appearance with the Canadians.
Although her parents were both English-speaking, Mrs. Geoffrin finds she has a bit of trouble finding English words, especially on shopping trips.
However, to keep bilingualism in the family, the Geoffrins are sending Linda to an English-language school.
Do the children get to see a lot of hockey games during the season?
Mrs. Geoffrin said she brings Linda and Robert to a game only once a year.
"And I bring them to the forum only on Saturday because they have to be at school on weekdays," she added.

"I haven't had the chance to see Bernie play anywhere but in the Forum. I have to stay with the children."
