## Swimming Pool Plans Discussed

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
James Hogan, chairman of the Leisure committee, has investigated the feasibility of installing a swimming pool in the new Prince County Vocational School, reported last night at the Summerside branch's annual meeting that there are still "many unanswered questions" in regard to this project.  
"It looks now," Mr. Hogan said, "that the pool may cost in the vicinity of \$120,000, but that doesn't mean that the legion will have to pay for it all."  
He also mentioned that some assistance could be obtained through a municipal loan and the winter works program. "If we can't do it," Mr. Hogan said, "maybe we can find somebody who will."  
It was also noted that plans for such a pool being installed by Keith Pickard, an expert, "to be completed within a couple of weeks."  
In answering a question from the floor Mr. Hogan said that the provincial government has made no move towards building a swimming pool. "The hole is there for anyone to build it," he said.
