**NOCTURNAL**

City dwellers cannot realize what absolute darkness is like until they find themselves far from any settlement, on a cloudy, moonless night. Then the darkness can almost be felt. One of the greatest mysteries of nature is night migration. Mysterious, too, is the way Owls, Wilson's Snipes, Rails, and Black-crowned Night Herons manage to get around when most creatures are sleeping.

Though many birds are night migrants, they have not chosen to travel at this time because they like it, but from necessity. In daylight they must stop over to forage as well as rest. They face many dangers as they journey, the worst being bright, dazzling lights such as they encounter at lighthouses, and tall, city buildings against which they are apt to fly and perish.

Perhaps you have come across an Owl sitting on a branch, dozing in the sunshine. It is possible to go quite close before the bird takes to flight, and for that reason people are inclined to think that Owls are blind in daytime. This is not really so, they are just trusting that they will not be noticed. A few even hunt by day, but habitually they are quite nocturnal, doing much the same work in darkness as Hawks do in sunlight. Nevertheless, like bats, they seem to prefer moonlit nights to complete darkness, and their calls are most often heard during the first part of the night and in the early morning.

Several other kinds of birds are not absolutely nocturnal, yet they move around after dark. The Wilson's Snipe often keeps fairly quiet through the day, then after sundown, runs over the marshy ground, probing for worms. Towards dusk the Rail appears from its cover, walking hen-fashion, with upturned tail and bobbing head, at the border of its home bog. The Black-crowned Night Heron, as its name indicates, seems to prefer night to day for feeding. As twilight deepens, it leaves home, and seeks its favourite fishing ground, which may be several miles distant. There, with
