



SPACE BALLOON

In Washington, William J. O'Sullivan, national advisory committee for aeronautics, sits beside the 30-inch "space ball" he designed and which will be launched by the U.S. 300 miles above the earth within the next nine months. O'Sullivan holds the inflation cartridge in his right hand and shows how the "sub-satellite" is folded to be carried in the rocket. When launched from its rocket, the ball will first be inflated by a cartridge of nitrogen. Once the balloon is inflated, the aluminum foil is strong enough to keep the ball rounded without any pressure inside. The "space ball" contains 65 cents worth of aluminum foil sandwiched to a sheet of plastic.

Big Plowing Match Today

SIMCOE, Ont. (CP) - J. G. Tran, of Claremont, Ont., Wednesday won the Ontario championship at the 44th International Plowing Match, won in its second day on a farm near this town, 17 miles south of Brantford.
