THE DEATH SENTENCE.—At Brantford, Ont., last week, Amos Chaille was sentenced to be hanged on the 31st May for the murder of Jessie Keith. The trial lasted but one day. Chaille's crime was most brutal one. Jessie Keith, who lived about two miles out from Listowel, had been sent to that place on the morning of the murder for groceries and mail matter. While returning home, and when almost at the house, she was met on the railway track by her slayer, who, after stunning her with a severe blow on the head, dragged her across a ploughed field to a wood and there murdered her, by cutting her throat, and afterwards mutilated her body after the horrible manner of Jack the Ripper.

SHERWOOD CEMETERY.—The annual meeting of Sherwood Cemetery Company was held in the Y. M. C. A. Parlor yesterday afternoon, Charles Palmer, Esq., President, in the chair. A goodly number of shareholders attended, and considerable interest was taken in the proceedings. The report showed that the receipts from all sources for the past year amounted to \$387.00 and the expenditure to \$355.74. The late Board of Directors, Messrs. W. E. Charles Palmer, Judge Alley, W. E. Dawson, R. R. Hodgson and Donald McMillan, having determined to retire after six years' service, the following gentlemen were elected directors for the ensuing year, namely, F. S. Moore, H. BEARS NEAR THE CITY.—About a week ago a bear was observed in a field at Kingston, Lot 31, by two young men who were passing along the road. The same bear was also seen by several others a day or two previously. Yesterday six men went on a hunt for his bearship, but failed to locate him. They found several bear tracks in the snow which fell before the last storm, but could not find any fresh tracks to trace by. The search party included several Indians, and in their opinion there are two bears. The animal has been moving about between Cornwall and the Bedouque Road, for about two years, and was seen at the latter place last fall. If any person in that neighborhood observes fresh tracks they would confer a favor by notifying William Ward, of Kingston. If the bears are allowed to run at large much damage may be done to sheep and cattle. The presence of the bears causes considerable excitement in and about Kingston.
