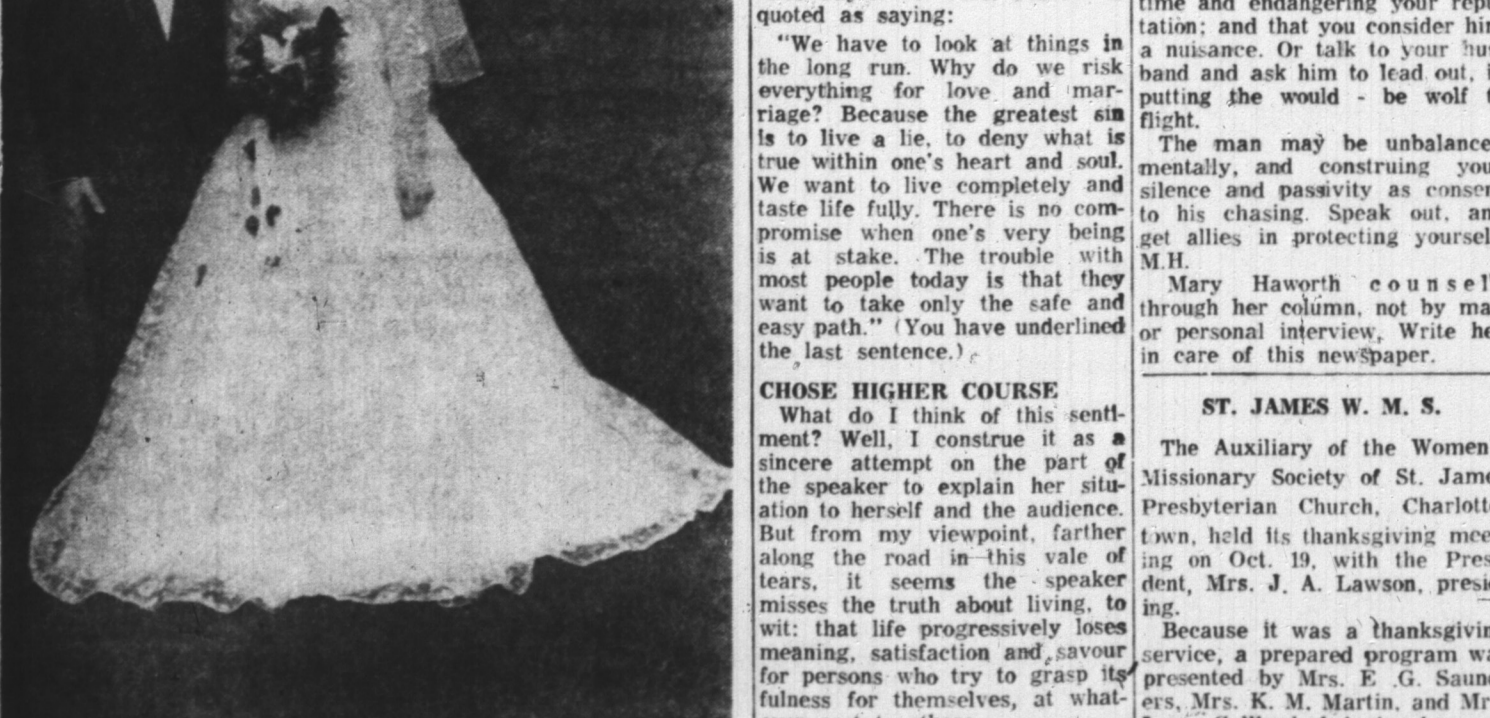
## ELLEN'S DIARY Gifts Of Lavender, Heather Are Frae Bonnie Scotland
