The Redpath Concert Company. A LARGE and appreciative audience greeted the Redpath Concert Company in the Y. M. C. A. Hall last evening. The Company, though small in number is rich in talent, and fully sustained the high reputation which preceded it. The whistling soloist—Miss Ella M. Chamberlain—demonstrated beyond the possibility of doubt that she is an artist in her peculiar line. She gave several very difficult solos in a manner which captivated the audience, and elicited loud applause. The programme to-night will be totally changed. Those who appreciate good vocal and instrumental music as well as those who can enjoy a hearty laugh, should attend in full force. Wiggins' Storm. An Ottawa despatch says: E Stone Wiggins of the Finance Department here, the well known weather prophet and astronomer, still adheres to his prediction made two years ago, of a storm of excessive magnitude to take place in September next. He says the storm will rank in point of destructiveness as one of the greatest events of 1886. It will rage in the British Isles from the 25th to the 27th of September inclusive, and striking across the Atlantic, it will be felt with great severity in America on the evening of the 29th. Its breadth will extend from Quebec to Sandy Hook and the storm king will be accompanied by tremendously high tides as well as by a wind blowing at the rate of sixty miles an hour. The storm will be northeast at Quebec, while at Sandy Hook it will be experienced in an easterly direction. The approaching autumn will be remarkable for great earthquakes in North and South America, both preceding and following the storm. The duration of the latter in America will be several days, during which the danger to the ocean marine will be anything but trifling. These phenomena are ascribed to the peculiar positions to be occupied by the planets in September next. Mount Stewart Notes. The work of the busiest season of the year has commenced and the farmers in the vicinity are taking advantage of the fine but cool weather. Our leading merchant has received his summer supply of hats and boots which he is selling so cheap that the excitement is extraordinary. The ice is still on the north shore, keeping the fishermen from getting out their lobster traps and catching the herring needful for bait. Two vessels have arrived for loads of oats and potatoes. The prices are very low. The legend connected with the birth of the Prince Imperial is brought up again in Paris, with the rumor, mentioned in a cable despatch, that a beautiful young girl bearing a striking resemblance to the Empress Eugenie is about to bring legal proceedings in Paris "to have herself recognized as the daughter and heir of that unhappy lady."
