Let's Talk It Over

The reading of good books once held a high place in the list of recreations pursued by the human race, but we fear and regret that this entertaining and inspiring pastime has not been holding its own in recent years. Once upon a time, nearly everybody except, of course, the illiterate, read books, a great percentage of them of the better class. Today there are so many counterattractions and recreations that compete with this quiet hour of communing with the great writers of all ages, that many who have the natural endowment for enjoying good reading are led into detours of more exciting, but on the whole less satisfying ways of filling their leisure hours.

Then there are the dismaying amount of books on the market today that, if not actually harmful, are at least trivial and cheap and bear the same relation to good literature as slang does to the Queen's English. In this age of the automobile and the aeroplane, and the hustle and bustle of competitive business life this quiet interlude of reading should form a more delightful contrast, and be even more enjoyable than in olden days.

On the other hand, there are those omnivorous readers who do not scarcely anything else. They live in the world of books and shut the world that swirls around them completely out. They live in a storybook past, pursuing for the most part idealistic forms of literature, and world realities grate
