ment on Real Estate for City

[Assented to 15th June, 1867.]
BE IT enacted by the City Council of the
City of Charlotte:
Section 1. That there shall be an assessment
levied on Real Estate, within the City, for the
purpose of raising a Revenue for the current
year; and that such assessment shall be at the
rate of Ten shillings on each Hundred pounds
of the value of such Real Estate, equal to one
shilling on every one pound of the rental, and
shall be paid by the occupants of real estates,
within the City, according to the several prop-
erties or valuations entered against the same
of each and every person in the Assessment
Books, prepared from the returns of the
Assessors, according to the Act of Incorporation.
Section 2. In cases where the occupant,
named in the Assessment Book, shall have left
the premises so assessed, before the time of
giving the notice required by law, such notice
shall be served upon the person actually in
possession; and, if the premises be vacant,
then such notice shall be served upon the owner
thereof, or his agent, and if neither owner shall
be deemed, for the purposes of this Law, the oc-
cupant; and such occupant or owner, in the
cases aforesaid, shall be severally liable for the
payment of the sum entered against the name
of the original occupant in the Assessment Books
delivered to the Collector, subject to the same
and to appeal as in and by the Act aforesaid
was enacted—anything in the bye-law of the
City, entitled "A Law for the collection of the
City Revenue," to the contrary notwithstanding.
Section 3. The moneys, when collected,
according to the bye-law of the City for that
purpose, shall be expended and paid to and for
the use of the City, in such way and manner

[Assented to 15th June, 1867.]
BE IT enacted by the City Council of the
City of Charlotte:
Section 1. That there shall be an assessment
levied on Real Estate, within the City, for the
purpose of raising a Revenue for the current
year; and that such assessment shall be at the
rate of Ten shillings on each Hundred pounds
of the value of such Real Estate, equal to one
shilling on every one pound of the rental, and
shall be paid by the occupants of real estates,
within the City, according to the several prop-
erties or valuations entered against the same
of each and every person in the Assessment
Books, prepared from the returns of the
Assessors, according to the Act of Incorporation.
Section 2. In cases where the occupant,
named in the Assessment Book, shall have left
the premises so assessed, before the time of
giving the notice required by law, such notice
shall be served upon the person actually in
possession; and, if the premises be vacant,
then such notice shall be served upon the owner
thereof, or his agent, and if neither owner shall
be deemed, for the purposes of this Law, the oc-
cupant; and such occupant or owner, in the
cases aforesaid, shall be severally liable for the
payment of the sum entered against the name
of the original occupant in the Assessment Books
delivered to the Collector, subject to the same
and to appeal as in and by the Act aforesaid
was enacted—anything in the bye-law of the
City, entitled "A Law for the collection of the
City Revenue," to the contrary notwithstanding.
Section 3. The moneys, when collected,
