Ch'town Park Goes Tonight

Action for the 1965 season gets underway tonight at the Charlottetown Driving Park with the curtain raiser set to leave the wire at 8:15.

There have been several changes in the local parks management and personnel this season with the intention of giving the patrons of the local raceway the best possible entertainment.

The plant is in excellent shape and we think any person interested in the race game will find things pretty much to their liking at the Charlottetown Driving Park.

Tonight's curtain raiser will have eight entries leaving the wire and Irv Averill looks like a popular choice with the betting customers at the Charlottetown oval in this class.

Challenger Pick a new horse at the local track which is owned jointly by Vic MacDonald and Oliver Smith, Charlottetown will make its first appearance at the CDP in the second event with Don MacNeill holding the ribbons MacNeill was the leading driver in North America in the 200-299 starts division last year.

The third event on the eight dash program will be the main attraction on the card. The field will include: June Byrd, Dominion Byrd, Lord Adious, Hurrah and Eloise Wick. June Byrd and Hurrah will probably be favored heavily in this class, but any of the remaining three horses are capable of leading the way to the wire.

The Poulton stable looks like a strong entry in the fourth and seventh dashes. Harry Poulton will be up behind Jolly Duck while Oliver Poulton will hold the reins on Helen's Dream.

The stable of Shelton Byrd and Dale looks like a good bet in the fifth and eighth dashes.

The sixth event has some good horses leaving the wire and we will be looking for a close finish with Janet M. Rushaway Chief and Billy G. Command being right at the top.

Tid Bits From Here And There

Canadian Heavyweight Boxing Champion George Chuvalo of Toronto will fight Sonny Andrews, not Tiger Wright, in a 10-round non-title bout in Saint John, N.B., Monday night. Fight promoter Ron Brothers said Friday Wright, who fights out of Philadelphia, had wrecked an arm while sparring with Sonny Liston; prior to Liston's world title fight with Cassius Clay last month.

"We are certain Andrews will be a far better opponent for Chuvalo," said Brothers. "He has been more active than Wright and he has never been knocked out. He has gone the distance with Floyd Patterson before losing a decision." Andrews, 26, who fights out of Boston, was a sparring partner for Cassius Clay.

Chuvalo is scheduled to fight Dave Bailey, a former sparring partner of Clay's in Glace Bay, N.S., June 19. Chuvalo is listed third in the May ratings of the World Boxing Association.

Boom Boom Geoffron agreed Friday to sign a contract to coach Quebec Aces of the American Hockey League again next season. He piloted the team to first place in the Eastern Division of the AHL last season. The Aces were beaten by Rochester in the semi-finals of the Calder Cup playoffs.

The provincial high school interscholastic track and field competition will be staged at the Summerside Complex, today. Two winners from the respective divisions in each county meet will be competing for top honors.

The qualifying round in the Dowling Handicap will be played at the Belvedere Golf and Winter Club today; with the top 32 players qualifying for the tournament. This is one of only two match plays remaining at the local club this season.

Belmont Stakes This Afternoon

NEW YORK (AP) — Eight three-year-old horses, one of them a surprise, were entered Friday for the 97th running of the Belmont Stakes at Aqueduct today.

The odds-makers lost no time forecasting a three-horse race involving Tom Rolfe, Dapper Dan and Hall To All, who finished 1-2-3 in the Preakness.

Ron Turcotte of Grand Falls, N.B., will be Tom Rolfe's jockey as he was in the Preakness.

The surprise horse is Happy Gondolier, owned by Ada L. Rice of Chicago. Her silks were carried to victory in the Kentucky Derby by Lucky Debonair, now sidelined with leg injuries.

Tom Rolfe, who beat Dapper Dan by the thinnest of margins in the Preakness after running third in the Kentucky Derby, was made the 6-to-5 choice to carry the silks of Raymond Guest, United States ambassador to Ireland, to victory in the final leg of the triple crown.

Dapper Dan, whose late charge also fell a trifle short in the Kentucky Derby, will run coupled in the betting with Bold Bidder. The entry, trained by Bill Winfrey, was quoted at 7-to-5.

Hall To All, winner of the Jersey Derby on Monday, was made the 3-to-1 third choice. He, like Dapper Dan, is expected to trail the early pace and then turn on the power when they straighten out for the final one-quarter mile run to the finish line.

Jim Gentile Has Been Traded

KANSAS CITY (AP) — First baseman Jim Gentile of Kansas City Athletics, for five years one of the American League's most potent hitters, was traded Friday to Houston Astros of the National League.

The Athletics, mired in 10th place and hurting at the gate, swapped the 31-year-old Gentile for \$100,000 cash and two players — one a minor league pitcher and the other a yet-to-be-named prospect.

General manager Hank Peters of Kansas City said Gentile was traded to give 23-year-old Ken Harrelson an opportunity to play regularly.

Gentile said he was not surprised at the trade although he is tied with five other players for the American League home run lead with 10. He is batting .246. Last season he batted .251 and had 28 homers.

Ronnie Stewart To Be Traded

TORONTO (CP) — Ron Stewart, a 13-year National Hockey League veteran, may have spent his last season in the uniform of Toronto Maple Leafs.

Toronto coach George (Punch) Imlach said Friday he is trying to trade the 32-year-old right winger before the annual NHL player draft in Montreal next week.

"New York (Rangers) and Boston (Bruins) are both interested in Ron," Imlach said. "But as yet they haven't offered me anything worthwhile. I might be better to wait and take the \$30,000 draft price."

"There's a third team nibbling at the moment and I'm not going to give him away," Stewart has scored 186 goals during his pro career, all with the Leafs. Last season he scored 16 goals and assisted on 11 others.

International Auto Race Set To Go At Mosport Park

By JOHN TRACY BOWMANVILLE, Ont. (CP)— Jim Hall of Midland, Texas, turned in the fastest lap in the history of Mosport Park Friday when he lapped the 2.45-mile circuit in one minute, 27.3 seconds in qualifying trials.

With his record — shattering mark the Texas millionaire nailed down No. 1 starting position on the grid for today's 200-mile race for sports cars.

Hall, driving a Chev-powered Chaparral, clipped three seconds off the lap record set a year ago by New Zealander Bruce McLaren.

McLaren himself beat his own record by lapping in 1:28.5 in his McLaren Special but world champion John Surtees of Britain came right along behind him with a lap of 1:28.1 in a Chev-powered Lola.

Jim Clark, British driver who won the Memorial Day 500-mile race at Indianapolis Monday, earned fourth grid position with 1:28.7 in a Lotus 30.

The blistering pace set by the four drivers gave an indication of the speeds that may be expected in today's race.

Hall, who won the 12 hours at Sebring this spring, is driving the only car in the field of 33 with automatic transmission.

His chief Canadian competitor was expected to come from Ludwig Heimrath, Canadian driving champion of 1961 and 1964. The German-born driver sat on Hall's tail-pipes for the first few practice laps but the Torontonian's Ford-powered McLaren Special was no match for the Texas car.

Jim Clark, winner of the 500-mile Memorial Day race at Indianapolis last Monday, took it easy in practice sessions.

DESIGN CAR McLaren, holder of records for the lap on the 2.45-mile road circuit and the 200-mile distance, is driving an Olds-powered car of his own design.

Clark, under the watchful eye of designer Colin Chapman, is driving a Lotus 30.

The two-way speed weekend at the track 50 miles east of Toronto opened with technical inspection of the racing machinery. All cars, both in the feature race and preliminaries for formula cars and sedans, undergo a rigid safety inspection before being allowed on the track.

The start of today's big race, with prize money of \$10,700 at stake, will be from a grid in front of the control tower. Fastest qualifying car gets No. 1 position at the front of the grid.

EXPECT BIG CROWD Paid attendance at the 1964 spring race, totalling 41,224, was the biggest crowd at any sports event in Canadian history. Race officials hoped for better than 50,000 in today's race.

The event which draws crowds from as far away as Detroit and points in upstate New York was already taking on the aspects of a carnival weekend. Hundreds of tents had sprung up in the infield enclosed by the twisting asphalt circuit as fans got set to camp overnight, a night which traditionally includes guitar-playing, folk-singing and campfire - to - campfire visits by race-minded troubadours.

Rangers, Chicago In Player Trade

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Rangers traded four players to Chicago Black Hawks Friday for John MacKenzie and Ray Cullen.

The Rangers said they had given up defencemen Tracy Pratt and Dave Richardson, wing Dick Meissner and Mel Pearson.

Emile Francis, general manager of the Rangers, said he felt that the trade strengthened the New York club materially at the right wing and centre positions.

"We got two men while giving up four who didn't figure in our plans," he said.

Cullen was the most valuable rookie in the American League while MacKenzie, playing with Black Hawks, scored four goals and had 10 assists.

Three Records Are Broken In Prov. Elementry Track

SUMMERSIDE — Three track and field records were broken at the P.E.I. Elementary track and field meet here yesterday.

In the girls broad jump Jane Johnson of Queen Charlotte High School in Charlottetown jumped 14 feet six inches to topple a record of 13 feet 9 3/4 inches set in 1964 by Paulette LeBlanc of Air Marshall Johnson school at the local RCAF station.

The 1964 record setter finished third in the event yesterday with a jump of 12 feet 7 1/4 inches.

David Bagloe of Athena Regional High School here made a record breaking jump of 18 feet 4 inches in the boys broad jump, bettering the 1964 mark of 15 ft 3 3/4 inches set by Ken O'Brien of Sherwood.
