Latest and most important event to take place at Assembly was U.N. approval of a formal invitation to Communist China to send a representative to the U.N. Security Council, on Nov. 15 for hearings on the Formosa question. Against last-ditch opposition from Nationalist China delegate Dr. T. F. Chiang, who tried without success first to invoke the veto to kill off the council's invitation and finally to ask the international court of justice to sustain his veto argument, the Communist government of China won a major victory in its 10-month campaign to take part in U.N. deliberations.
