U.S. Nuclear Task Force To Be Moved

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Navy's nuclear-powered task force, including the giant carrier Enterprise, will be shifted to the Pacific starting this fall, Defence Secretary McNamara announced here.
The Enterprise, now undergoing overhaul, and the guided-missile frigate Bainbridge will be moved from the Atlantic

Fleet to the Pacific Fleet in October:
The guided-missile cruiser Long Beach and the guided-missile frigate Truxtun, newest nuclear-powered surface warship, will be transferred to the Pacific sometime in 1966.
The announcement said that the proposal "to utilize the unique endurance and self-sufficiency of the nuclear powered task force in the Pacific Ocean area has been under study for some time."
A Pentagon spokesman said the move is not related to the war in South Viet Nam, although the presence of the four nuclear surface warships obviously would enhance U.S. strike power in critical waters.

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
