Ch'town Council Appoints Full-Time Fire Marshal

Appointment of Louis R. Rananah, long-time employee of the City Street Department and veteran member of the local Fire Department, as the City's first full-time Deputy Fire Marshal and Inspection Officer, was approved at last night's regular meeting of the City Council. The new position will carry a salary of \$3,600 per annum.

Recent "very active" attempts to do something towards the elimination of some of the more serious fire hazards in the City had convinced the Fire Committee of the need for this specialized service. Councillor Boyles, mover of the resolution noted.

The Inspection Officer would work under the direction of Fire Chief Jewell, the City Fire Marshal, he added.

He would be sent to Halifax to learn how the inspection service was conducted in that City, and would also be instructed to bring back a copy of the regulations under which the inspection service operated, the Chairman of the Fire Committee said. These could be studied with a view to setting up similar regulations here.
