The plank for repairing the city streets has arrived, and the City Surveyor will at once have all defective sidewalks put in order. A large amount of work was done on the streets in May. No less than \$430 was paid for labor during that month. The steamer Ulunda, Captain S. R. Hill, arrived from Montreal this morning and will leave for Boston via Halifax, on Monday forenoon, at 11 o'clock. By the courtesy of Captain Hill, the steamer will be thrown open to visitors to-morrow (Sunday) from 3 till 5 p. m. AN Ottawa despatch of the 4th inst., says: 'In the cricket match at Rideau Hall to-day, between the Parliamentary Eleven, and Government House, one innings was played on each side. The score stood: Government House, 67; Parliamentary Eleven, 63; Lansdowne, bowled by Davies, made 21. His Excellency is a good batsman. In a match between the Senate and House of Commons, the latter won in one innings with twelve to spare.' A TYPE-SETTING contest between Joseph McCann, of the New York Herald, and Ira Sommers, of the New York World, for a purse of \$500, was decided in the Star office on Thursday last. The men set for three hours; McCann putting up 6,325 ems of solid minion, without paraphrasing, and Sommers 6,072. In the first hour McCann set 2,123 ems, beating the best previous record of 2,064, made by compositor Aronsberg some years ago. THE Captain of the schooner Mabel Howard, which arrived at Halifax from the West Indies on Tuesday last, reports that the schooner Vespa, of Liverpool, was loading sugar at Barbadoes for a port in F. E. Island, and during her stay there a sailor from Liverpool while on watch one night was killed. The body was found floating down stream next day. R. K. Fox, of New York, sent a cable despatch to Beach at Melbourne on the 30th ultimo, offering to match Hanlan against him to row three, four or five miles in American waters for from \$7,000 to \$6,000 a side and to allow Beach \$500 for expenses. Mr. Fox believes that in this climate Hanlan can reverse the defeat which Beach inflicted upon him. Beach has refused to enter any regatta in America. THE Illustrated London News, which has some good sketches of our volunteers on the way to the scenes of their victories, speaks of Riel as that conceited and fanatical mongrel Canadian who got up the Red River insurrection of 1870, and it says that the "colonial troops under General Middleton have done admirable service in a brief campaign of hard marching and sharp shooting. LONDON, June 6. Intense excitement prevails over the Ministerial crisis on the renewal of the Irish Crimes Act. Lord Spencer declares that "coercion" is indispensable for the Government of Ireland. A majority of the Cabinet favor according to Lord Spencer's demand. Mr. Gladstone is anxious to prevent a split in the party on the approach of a general election; but it is reported that Dilke and Chamberlain will insist on resigning. British Columbia Protesting. OTTAWA, June 6. A British Columbia despatch to Mr. Homer, M. P., says: "Mass meetings were held all over the province. Vancouver, New Westminster, Yale, Lillooet and Cariboo protest against the Timber and Land Act. If the Government enforce it there will be open rebellion. CURRENT NOTES.

The King of Burmah is said to be seeking an alliance with France. Russia is retaliating for Germany's expulsion of Poles from Prussia. Lady Lansdowne will leave for England in the middle of July to see her sons who are being educated there. London Punch this week has a poem laudatory of ex-Minister Lowell and expressive of regret at his departure from England. An imperial Chinese decree directs the commander of the Black Flags to evacuate Tonquin by the time agreed upon by France and China. Lieut.-Governor Masson, of Quebec, has obtained four months' leave of absence, and will proceed to Europe for the benefit of his health. During his absence Sir Narcisse Belleau will be acting Lieutenant-Governor. The French government is now prepared to carry out the projected organization of its possessions on the Congo River into a French Colonial State. M. de Brazza, the rival to Stanley in Central African explorations, will be made Governor of the French Congo State. The Spanish government has introduced into the Chamber of Deputies, a bill to raise a twenty-five million dollar loan for fifteen years, for the benefit of the Cuban Treasury. The loan is to bear six per cent interest, and to be guaranteed by a Cuban stamp tax and by the home government. The Cabinet held the first council since the Whitauitide recess on Thursday last. A complete reconciliation has been effected on the Irish Crimes act. The remaining business before the dissolution of Parliament includes the Crimes Act, the Irish Land Purchase bill and the Scotch Crofters bill. Parliament will terminate at the end of July. The affection from which Mr. Childers is suffering is diabetes. His retirement from the Ministry is inevitable.
