

Shepilov Says "No" More Charming Than Molotov

LONDON (Reuters) — Statesmen who met Russian Foreign Minister Dmitri Shepilov for the first time at the Suez conference found him in striking contrast to his stiff predecessor, V. M. Molotov.

Shepilov also says "no". But he says it less harshly and gives at least the surface impression that some time or other he might be persuaded to change it to "maybe," or even "yes."

The tall, good-looking Russian has a pleasant, relaxed manner. Unlike the taut, remote Molotov, he smiles easily.

Little is known of his life and career before he became editor-in-chief of the government newspaper Pravda only a few years ago. But from his appearance, one could guess he had been more of a sportsman than a politician. His big body is muscular and he holds it loosely like a trained boxer.

walk, loping along with his officials pumping their legs to keep pace with his long strides.

In his dress, too, he is far from the conventional diplomat. He never wears a hat. His suits are sporty—sometimes an odd shade of tan, sometimes light grey, and always with rather sloppy seams and less shoes of a matching color.

He looks almost Bohemian among the prim derby hats and striped pants of the British diplomats. But when he is invited to a formal lunch, he bows to the proprieties by changing into a dark suit and black shoes.

He even surprised London by turning up for the opening official dinner of the Suez conference in a dinner jacket. Officials are still arguing whether he is the first Soviet statesman ever to make such a concession to Western convention.

FOND OF CHILDREN

Like Georgi Malenkov and other of the new generation of Soviet leaders, he seems unable to resist children. On his walks he pats youngsters on the head or suddenly grabs them from their fathers and mothers and lifts them

high above his head.

He has one mannerism which suggests that inwardly he is not so relaxed as his appearance indicates. This is frequent combing of his thick hair which is turning from black to grey.

One morning this week, as he stood on the embassy steps, he fumbled about his pockets in vain for his comb. When he failed to find it, he sent embassy servants with orders to produce it before he would leave for his engagement.

Western diplomats have found him endearing in both drinking and eating. They also find him refreshing to talk to — much less stilted than Molotov.

As a statesman, they say, he has not yet the stature of his predecessor, but there is no doubt about his grasp and knowledge of international affairs.

Shepilov generally is believed to have been from the start the brain behind the Soviet policy of going all out to undermine Western influence in the Middle East by concentrated wooing of the Arab countries.

Monday, August 27th, is "Blood Donor Day" for the residents of Souris and the surrounding area. In an all-out effort to replenish Prince Edward Island's badly depleted Blood Bank, the Red Cross Blood Donor Committee at Souris, under the chairmanship of Mayor Bruce Stewart, is doing it utmost to reach or exceed Souris's objective of 200 blood donors. Through the co-operation of Monsignor Murphy, the clinic will again be held in the spacious St. Mary's Hall. Committees from the Junior Ladies' Auxiliary of Souris Hospital, of which Mrs. Bruce Stewart is the president, are canvassing for donors and arranging for workers and refreshments for this clinic.

Souris Centre Of Activity

Souris is a busy spot at the present time with 13 draggers operating out of the port and the two fish plants processing the landed fish. At the greatly improved wharf in Souris, a large German steamer, the Saint Michael, is loading wood pulp. The Saint Michael is a very modern ship which arrived here on Thursday by way of Montreal. A steady stream of trucks are carrying wood pulp to the dock, and the very modern German loading facilities are handling the cargo very quickly. However, it will take several days to load the large steamer.

Although the draggers based at Souris have been doing well, the off-shore fishermen in their small boats are having one of the best years in a long, long time.

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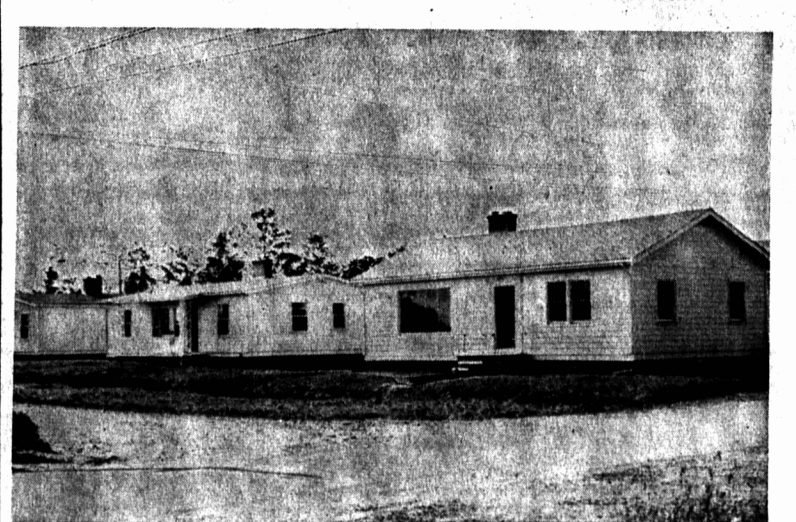
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
