Some 44 governors representing the 10 provincial locals of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation will attend the two-day annual meeting of the board of governors commencing 11:15 a.m. at the Prince of Wales Hotel in Charlottetown.

The main items of business will be consideration of resolutions submitted by the various locals and the election of officers scheduled for tomorrow at 11 a.m. Chairman for the resolutions discussion will be Frank Costello, while chairman of the nominating committee is Mrs. Margie Dover.

Also on the agenda are remarks by the president of the Federation, Thomas Hall, principal of Athena Regional High School, who will also report on films shown were "Monkey Tail," "Look Alert, Stay Alert," "Bicycle Safety" and "Case of Tom Tucker."

Charles Campbell, vice president of the Island Federation, will give a report on the Atlantic Conference held in October at the vocational institute in Charlottetown. John Yu will report on the recent meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Executive Board at Prince of Wales College.

New members from Hunter River, Kensington, Montserrat and Souris will be introduced by Mrs. Margie Dover, Winifred Stevenson, who sent the auditors report and the 1964-65 budget was announced by Weston Carmody of the financial committee.

Various committee reports will be given by chairman; Frank Lidstone, pension commission; Francis MacNeill, salary; David Costello, property; Gordon Boyer, radio-visual; Alice Fraser, research and a report of the CRC International Conference on Research. The provincial executive will meet this evening and the entire session will conclude Saturday afternoon.

Cerebral Palsy Conference Set For City In June 1965

Montgomery Hall, Charlottetown, will be the venue for the fifth Atlantic Conference on Cerebral Palsy, to be held on June 4, 5 and 6, 1965. It was announced yesterday following a planning session of establishments of the Cerebral Palsy and Mental Retardation in Moncton Tuesday afternoon.

The theme of the conference is "Parental Responsibility in the Cerebral Palsy Program." Among the projected panels is one dealing with sheltered workshops and activity centres. Special speakers will be secured for the conference. Discussion groups are planned, as well as several social events during the course of the conference. Interest to the group, Baby sitters will be provided for delegates with children.

A large attendance is expected for the meeting in the ladies' gymnasium of the Prince of Wales College. Delegates will come from New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Previous conferences were held in Sackville and Fredericton, N.B.; Halifax and Amherst, N.S.

(Continued from page 1) made of the implications of forms of land tenure and that other related matters be the subject of study of the house authority already recommended by the federation of agriculture.

On the financing of education, one resolution pointed out that most education committees to increase and since it is agreed that farm properties bear a relatively higher proportion of the burden than do residences and other rate payers, the committee in consideration should be given to devising a more equitable system of taxation for financing education.

Stating that the provincial minimum wage does not apply to workers in processing plants, one resolution asked that the wage regulation apply to men and women employed in the plants.

(Continued from page 1) RCAF rescue centre at Halifax was notified.

At 7:30 a.m. the rescue centre reported that the nearest available ship was the 228-foot coast guard vessel Walter E. Hallister which could leave Saint John, N.B. at 8 a.m.

By 8:30 the lobster boat was spotted anchored about one mile offshore near Clark's Harbor on Cape Sable Island. Efforts to reach her by two other fishing vessels were thwarted by heavy seas and the anchor rope of the anchor boat drifted helplessly out to sea.

The Shelburne Coast Guard, a weekly newspaper, said editorially Thursday that by the afternoon of Dec. 1 rescue headquarters had discovered the fisheries patrol boat Cygnus had been tied up at the wharf in front of his home.

MOST SHIPS UNSUITABLE

The paper said the 133-foot Cygnus spent almost two hours trying to get out of Shelburne harbor but it was soon obvious she was not a fit ship for the type of operation she returned to port at about 4 p.m.

The paper said the rescue centre was asked to send a helicopter at 9:50 a.m. Dec. 1 but the vessel which would be returned to port at about 4 p.m.

By noon the wind slackened for awhile and another request was made to search and rescue for a helicopter with the same result. At approximately 1 p.m. the wind swung to the northwest and shortly after this the boat broke her anchor rope.

The paper said "no satisfactory answer has been given to the question why did search and rescue officials not know the Cygnus was tied up at the Shelburne wharf and why is our area where 2,300 lobster licences are sold is there no rescue vessel available in case of emergency."

The Yarmouth Board of trade voted Wednesday to ask the federal government to establish a rescue centre at Shelburne.

an all-weather coast guard... They said most vessels available for search and rescue work are fair-weather ships not suitable for service during storms on the Atlantic coast or in the Bay of Fundy. William Moffatt, general manager of British Columbia Packers Limited at Clark's Harbor, said during the search for Quilley and Smith that the Cygnus could have left Shelburne in the morning and reached the drifting boat while it was still only a mile or so off shore if it had been known in time that the Cygnus was nearby.
