**ASHORE AT CAPE TORMENTINE.**—The schooner Lady Speedwell, owned and commanded by Captain Henry Rhynard, of Picton, was driven ashore at Cape Tormentine in the gale of Tuesday night last. The Lady Speedwell sailed from Picton with a cargo of coal and was bound for Miami. She will be a total loss. No lives were lost. The cargo was insured, but there was no insurance on the vessel.—Moncton Times.

**THE CARNIVAL OF NATIONS.**—Prof. MacQuarrie, who with Miss Helen Macdonald is putting on the spectacular production of the "Carnival of Nations" at the Opera House on the 1st and 2nd of June, left for Halifax this morning where he will join Mr. Alfred A. Farland the world renowned banjoist, who has been especially engaged by Prof. MacQuarrie to give several recitals in Halifax and St. John. While at Halifax Prof. MacQuarrie will select the costumes and scenic effects from his establishment there to be used in the "Carnival of Nations" here. A large number of the costumes have been especially designed and are very handsome. He returns to Charlottetown on Tuesday of next week.

**MORE TRAINS.**—On and after Monday next, May 22nd, additional trains, will be run on the Prince Edward Island Railway, which will make the service as follows:—Express leaves Charlottetown at 6.30 a. m. arrives at Summerside 8.45 a. m., departs Summerside at 9.15 a. m. and arrive at Tignish at 12.30 p. m. Departs as Express from Tignish at 2.55 p. m., arrives at Summerside 6.10 p. m. and departs for Charlottetown on arrival of steamer from Point du Chene.

Express leaves Charlottetown at 7 a. m., arrives at Souris at 10 a. m. and Georgetown at 9.10 a. m. Accommodation leaves Souris at 11.35 a. m., Georgetown at 12.30 p. m. and arrives at Charlottetown 3.50 p. m. Express leaves Souris at 6.10 a. m. and Georgetown at 6.47 a. m., arriving at Charlottetown at 9.00 a. m. The accommodation train leaves Charlottetown at 2.00 p. m. arrives at Souris at 6.10 p. m. and Georgetown at 6.05 p. m.

All at Eastern Standard Time. No change in the time of the departure and arrival of accommodation trains in and out of Tignish and Summerside in the morning and Charlottetown to Summerside in the afternoon.
