SUNDAY SCHOOL CONFERENCE

Officers Elected This Forenoon. At the Provincial Sunday School Convention, which opened in the Baptist Church here yesterday, 90 members were reported from West Prince, 43 from Summerside and 50 from Charlottetown. A resolution calling upon the district convention to take more active part in this department, was carried. The report on Normal Class Work was given by Rev J Goldsmith. One class with twenty members has been formed and worked very successfully. It was shown that New Brunswick Association has 1030 students, and that last year 130 took the examination. There was a large attendance at the evening session. After the usual opening proceedings Mr. J. K. Ross addressed the convention in behalf of the city schools. He was followed by Rev. W. J. Kirby who spoke in behalf of the churches and citizens. Rev Messrs Montgomery and Finlayson responded to the words of welcome. The other speakers were Rev Messrs Goldsmith Lucas and Freeman. All the addresses were appropriate to the occasion and were listened to with the closest attention. Murray Harbor; Mr D Scurman, Charlottetown; Mr Thos Moyses, Central Bedouque. Superintendent Home Department—W C Turner, Charlottetown. The following Committee, with the president and secretary of the Association, was appointed to attend the meeting of the National Sabbath School Convention to be held at Atlanta, Ga, on the 27th April: Rev Geo Manifold, J K Ross, D Montgomery. Rev J D Freeman, of Fredericton, is among the clergymen in attendance, and his addresses on Sabbath school work have been very inspiring. This morning, Rev D Price delivered a capital address dealing with the Sabbath school as an evangelical force.

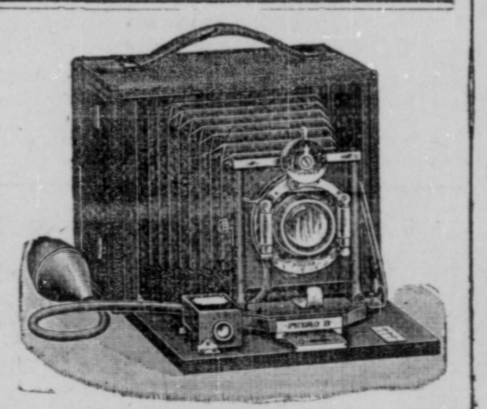

COMMITTED SUICIDE.—Mrs Lemuel Hayden, of Emsdale, ended her life yesterday by throwing herself in a well. She had been suffering from nervous trouble for some time past, and yesterday morning before the family were astir left the house attired only in her night clothes. Several hours later her dead body was found in a well about three quarters of a mile from her home. Mrs Hayden was about fifty years of age, and leaves a husband and five children to mourn their sad loss.

CONFIRMATION AT SOURIS.—A confirmation service was held in the Church of St. Alban the Martyr at Souris yesterday evening by His Lordship Bishop Courtney. The church contained a crowded congregation. The Bishop was assisted by the Rev. W. J. Godfrey, rector, and Rev. W. Cox acted as Bishop's Chaplain. Capt. W. H. Jackson, officiated as lay reader. At the close of the confirmation service, His Lordship delivered an impressive address to those who had been confirmed. Since the last visit of the Bishop to Souris the interior of the church has been painted and a new pulpit, altar rail and organ have been presented.

PROF. WIGGINS' OPINION.—In a lengthy interview concerning the autumnal showers of meteors, Professor E.
