Cape Breton Labor Will Ease Farm Help Problem

There is a definite shortage of farm labor in the Province, so say officials of the local office of the National Employment Service, thus supporting the statement made in Wednesday's edition of The Guardian by W.R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture. However, the problem of supplying haymakers has been tackled well in advance and thirty-one men will arrive in the Province on Monday afternoon by way of the Wood Island ferry. Twenty-two of these are destined for points in Queen's and Kings counties, the remainder will work in Prince County. The men are all from Cape Breton. Orders at present on hand at the local office for haymakers of twenty-two so that only four will be unfilled by Monday night. Moreover the local Employment Office explained it is expected that more men from Cape Breton may be available in a few days' time. Farmers who are being allotted men from the first contingent of Cape Bretoners have had their orders on file for a week or two, and are of course being looked after first. It is quite possible, said local officials, that many more farmers require men for haying than have placed orders with the Employment Service. In addition to the orders for haymakers, the local office has others on hand for nine year-around farm workers, and very few applicants were in sight. But two of these vacancies would eventually be filled by Dutch or German immigrants and some of the haymakers from Cape Breton may decide to remain in the Province. Each year a percentage of men brought in from the mainland elects to remain on the Island, and some of them establish permanent homes here. It is the opinion of the local Employment Office that the arrival of the Cape Bretoners will ease the farm labor situation to a great extent, and that if a second group can be recruited from the mainland, that most farmers will be able to obtain help for the haying season.

Bayonets Keep Uneasy Truce In Chicago Suburb

CICERO, Ill., July 13 (AP)—National Guardsmen stretched out barbed wire barricades today to block any new mob attempt to storm an apartment building in which a Negro family has rented a flat. Riots broke out in this Chicago suburb of 70,000 after the Negro bus driver moved his furniture into the apartment Tuesday. In New York, executive secretary Walter White of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People said he is flying to Chicago tonight to conduct an on-the-spot investigation of the riots. In a statement, he said in part: "From the investigations made to date, it is clear that the Cicero rioting has been planned for a long time and there is evidence of expert agitation in the leadership of the riot." The strings of barbed wire, forming a fence five strands deep, barricaded all street and alley entrances in the square block around the building. Some 300 steel-pelleted guardsmen armed with rifles and tear-gas grenades manned the barricade.

Toronto Unit Awarded Cup

OTTAWA, July 13 (CP)—A Toronto unit, the 2nd Field Regiment of the Royal Canadian Engineers, has been awarded the Gzowski Cup as the best all-round reserve force engineering unit in Eastern Canada. The unit, commanded by Lt. Col. R. Mitchell, won the trophy taken last year by the 56th Independent Field Squadron, R.C.E., of St. John's, Nfld. The St. John's unit came second this time. The cup was donated in 1935 by Col. (later Sir) Casimir S. Gzowski, an honorary aide-de-camp to Queen Victoria and a noted Canadian engineer.

New Naval Ships To Be Fought With Magic Eye

OTTAWA, July 13 (CP)—The new escort vessels Canada is building for the navy are expected to be fought and manoeuvred by men who see the enemy only through the magic eye of radar and other electronic apparatus. The whole low-slung, minimum-silhouette design of the anti-submarine craft is believed to tie in with the dangers of the atomic era, including those of atomic radiation. It is believed to incorporate an important departure from the system of fighting a ship under the direction of a small group standing on the open bridge exposed to enemy fire. In the new craft, that group would be inside, under cover, using radar, asdic and other electronic devices—more than on any comparable Canadian ship up to now—in special control rooms. Fourteen of them are in built across Canada but the first would be finished at least for a year. It is likely that only a tiny fraction of the crew would have to be on the open deck during action. It is even possible none will have to be out there, largely depending on whether the guns can be fully handled by radar and other electronic devices. The navy isn't saying since many facts about the ships are secret. At any rate, they will be a far cry from the days when the decks of ships in action swarmed with men. Those facts were indicated today in the wake of disclosure that Britain is about to test a group of rebuilt anti-sub frigates specially protected against atomic radiation. The Canadian ships will be provided with means for visual sites for direction of actions that way if necessary but they will be substitutes for the main system. The bridge, long a key part of any fighting ship, is expected virtually to disappear.

Shipments Of P.E.I. Swine For New Brunswick

Another shipment of Prince Edward Island swine will leave for the mainland on Monday morning when about two-thirds of a carload of Yorkshires will be forwarded to Hotel Dieu Hospital Farm in Madawaska County, N. B. The swine, numbering about 30 purebred Yorkshire sows and one boar, were purchased during the past two days by Mr. Antoine Landry, manager of the farm, accompanied by Mr. Harold Clay of the Dominion Department of Agriculture here and Mr. R. L. Farmer of the Dominion Department in New Brunswick. The animals were bought from various sections of the Province from Margate to Souris. Most of them are safely bred sows. Mr. Farmer intended to purchase a similar number of swine (Continued on Page 5 Col. 1)

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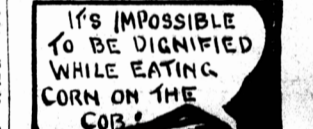
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IT'S IMPOSSIBLE TO BE DIGNIFIED WHILE EATING CORN ON THE COB
