IN MEMORIAM

DAVID W. MILLAR

A deep gloom of sorrow entered the homes of the immediate family, as well as friends and neighbours in Murray Harbour North and the surrounding districts on Sunday afternoon, August 12th, 1951, when it became known that the spirit of Mr. David Warren Millar had passed from this world to the Great Beyond at the age of 66 years.

Son of the late William Millar and Margaret Penny, he was born on the old homestead at Murray Harbour North where he was a life long resident and a successful and industrious farmer of the community.

On September 29th, 1926, he married Mrs. Nettie Graham daughter of the late Charles Jordan and Lillian Harris. To this union were born four children three of whom survive, and with their mother are left to mourn the loss of a kind and beloved husband and father. They are: Warren of Murray Harbour North; Lucy and Sadie on the homestead; also three step-children, Lillian, Mrs. John Milne, Woburn, Mass.; Charles and Leverett of Halifax.

The late Mr. Millar was of a quiet, unassuming manner, a worthy citizen, always interested in the welfare of the community. A true friend whose word was his bond, and a loyal and sympathetic neighbour ever ready to help others when needed. Given to hospitality, the door of his home was always open to a wide circle of friends and relatives who will ever cherish his memory. He was a faithful supporter and a consistent member of the church, and a regular attendance as long as his health permitted. His firm faith and trust in God, the loving Father, helped him to see beyond the things that are temporal and to look towards the things that are eternal.

The deceased had been a man of robust health until about seven years ago, following an operation he contracted a heart condition, but had recovered sufficiently to resume light work about the farm. Five days previous to his death he suffered a stroke followed by pneumonia. During his illness he was tenderly cared for by his loving wife and family, assisted by many kind relatives and friends, who were constantly at his bedside. As it was evident that his condition was not improved, on Sunday morning he was taken to the Kings County Hospital. All that medical aid and loving hands could do for him was done, but it was God's will that he be taken home, and on the above date he passed into eternal rest to be "forever with the Lord".

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved. Besides the immediate family there are left to mourn four sisters and four brothers. His funeral, which was largely attended, was held at the home Wednesday, August 15th. The impressive service was conducted by a former pastor Dr. James D. Robertson of Wilmore, Kty., assisted by Mr. Hugh Nugent, student Minister of Presbyterian Church, Murray Harbour North. Taking his text from St. John 14th Chapter, Verse 8, "Lord, show us the Father, and it sufficeth us." Dr. Robertson spoke words of comfort to the bereaved family and paid high tribute to the departed. Hymns sung were: "The Lord's My Shepherd", "Rock of Ages", and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus." A duet "Does Jesus Care" was feelingly rendered by Dr. and Mrs. Robertson. While loved ones and friends viewed the remains, the choir softly sang "Nearer My God to Thee".

The pallbearers were Elmer Millar, Harry Millar, John Glow, Chester MacLure, Edward Millar, Newton Hicken. His remains were tenderly laid to rest in the family plot, by the side of his infant son, who predeceased him several years ago.
