IN MEMORIAM

FRED DUNSFORD
For one who lived and loved it as wholeheartedly as he did, the sudden passing of Frederick Dunsford, Cornwall, on November 13th, came as a severe shock to his friends and relatives.

The late Mr. Dunsford retired the night previous to his death apparently in good health, and when he did not arise in the morning at his usual hour his daughter Helen, who resided with him, was shocked to find her father had passed away in his sleep. He had been under medical care for a heart ailment during the past few months but his condition had apparently improved and his death was unexpected.

The late Fred Dunsford was born in South Melville, P. E. Island on May 7, 1883, the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. George Dunsford.

He received his education at the rural school and in his young years moved to U. S. A. to reside.

While in U. S. A. he was married to the former Catherine Egan of Hampton, P. E. Island and a few years later he and his family returned to his native province and taken up farming in South Melville.

In 1927 he and his family moved to Cornwall where he followed his trade of carpentry and was ever ready to accommodate anyone requiring his help.

The late Mr. Dunsford was a just, God respecting man always honest and honorable in all his dealings.
